

Giant Salmon Road Show in Davis!!! FIN visits Korematsu Elementary and Davis Farmers' Market

The Save Our Wild Salmon Road Show arrived in Davis on Friday, April 25, 2008 and visited Korematsu Elementary School. Korematsu Elementary has five classrooms participating in the Club-sponsored Classroom Aquarium Education Program, and the traveling Giant Salmon Road Show was a perfect addition to the classroom program to help spread awareness of the plight of wild salmon. Teacher Sharyn Lieth took the lead and coordinated with the school principal Rob Rodden, and with Joseph Bogaard, who runs the Giant Salmon program. Lowell Ashbaugh and Adney Bowker were instrumental in getting the parties together to help arrange this event, and Joseph and the others with the Road Show arranged for a Davis Enterprise photographer to arrive for the event (see Sunday, April 27, 2008, front page article).

After arriving at Korematsu, the Giant Salmon program representatives spoke to the kids for a few minutes about the plight of the salmon, and then all got to climb into the salmon. The inside was large enough for the kids to stand up in, and was finished with outdoor scene mural decorations. All classes at Korematsu got to listen and participate, and it seemed to be a big hit, since virtually all the kids had just finished raising and releasing steelhead as part of the Classroom Aquarium Education Program. Lowell Ashbaugh, Adney Bowker, and Jack Norlyn all attended the event at Korematsu elementary.

On Saturday, April 26 the Road Show visited the popular Davis Farmers' Market and set up shop at the north end of the Market. The Save Our Wild Salmon representatives discussed the issues with residents and allow kids an opportunity to climb into the Salmon and view the mural. Nate Grader, one of the program representatives, indicated they were getting a continuous stream of visitors, with several members of the Fly Fishers of Davis making a showing. Lowell Ashbaugh set out club literature for people to take with them.



From the CONSERVATION DESK

<u>Conservation Mailing List</u> Water issues continue to top the list of environmental and political concerns in California. If you'd like to get timely notices of conservation issues join the FFD Conservation email list. Go to

<u>http://www2.dcn.org/mailman/listinfo/ffd-conservation</u> to join the group. I promise you won't get a lot of email – just a few important notices each month.

<u>Giant Salmon Road Show</u> The Save our Wild Salmon Fin to Davis on their tour from Washington State to Washington, DC last month to highlight the plight of salmon on the west coast. Look for the story elsewhere in this newsletter.

More Salmon Season Closure The California Fish and Game Commission closed salmon fishing on all 14 Central Valley rivers and streams except for a one-salmon bag limit in the Sacramento River from Red Bluff Diversion Dam to Knights Landing from November 1 to December 31. The Feather, American, Yuba and other popular salmon rivers will be closed to the take of spring run Chinook salmon also. This unprecedented action comes a month after closure of the ocean to salmon fishing. There's some evidence the few returning fish are about 90% hatchery raised; i.e. only 10% of the fish are wild. It's time we take better care of our rivers before all the fish are gone! Hatcheries are not the answer. If they were we wouldn't be in this population now. We've been operating them for 100 years but the fish population is suffering. It's about the habitat!

New head of Fish and Game Governor Arnold

Schwarzenegger on Wednesday appointed Donald Koch of Redding to be California's new director of the Department of Fish and Game. Koch, 55, retired in December after a 30-year career with the department as a biologist and supervisor. Since 1998, he served as North Coast regional manager, where he represented the department in complex Klamath River water negotiations. He replaces L. Ryan Broddrick, who resigned in August and now is executive director of the Northern California Water Association.

Koch, a Democrat, has a master's degree in biological sciences from Cal State Sacramento and a bachelor's degree in zoology from UC Davis. The position requires Senate confirmation, and the pay is \$142,965.

Trinity River Flow Upheld The Bureau of Reclamation considered recategorizing this year from a normal year a dry year, a move that would have allowed them to take more water from the Trinity River to send to the south state. BOR decided against the move, though, because it was illegal. The Record of Decision clearly calls for the decision to be made on April 1, when conditions indicated it was a normal year. There is no

justification, and no legal basis for setting the water year in May as the Bureau desired. Furthermore, a project is now underway to place spawning gravel in the river, and that requires higher flows to distribute it downstream.

FFF members please vote! All members of the Federation of Fly Fishers (and if you're not a member you should be) should have received the latest Rivermouth in mid-May. In it you'll find a ballot for the board of directors. Please tear it out, vote for the directors and officers, and put it in the mail. It's the only way we elect directors and officers, and we need your vote. Note that I'm on the directors list and I'm also running for Secretary.


Fly Fishing Classic of the Month By Gene Gantt

A Salty Piece of Land, A Novel

By Jimmy Buffett Summer is coming on us fast. Well maybe not fast enough, and when our minds start to wander off this book is a great escape. You can read it at home while sitting in the backyard waiting for the next fishing trip or while sitting around the campfire while next to the river. Where ever you are just read it and enjoy.

There are times when we just need a book that takes us away from the everyday problems and stress we face. Jimmy Buffet's novel *A Salty Piece of Land* does just that. It takes you away to far away places and makes

you forget your day-to-day struggles for a short time. Buffett is known by many for his singing and song writing talents. There are many fly anglers that are "Parrotheads" and follow Buffett through his music, and may not know about his books.



In this book, we meet Tully Mars, a cowboy, a beach bum, and a fly fisher. Fly of the Month for May Mercer's Micro Mayfly – By John Daniels



Mike Mercer of The Fly Shop in Redding is one of the most influential tyers in Northern California for one simple reason – his patterns catch a lot of fish. The Micro Mayfly is another gem from Mercer's fly box, although like so many of his commercial patterns, it is a bit more complicated than it really needs to be. The variant described below is a slightly simplified version I learned from Dave Sloan of American Fly Fishing (who picked it up from Dave Schaffer, I believe). While the original calls for an epoxy wing case, a signature Mercer feature in so many of his patterns, I usually omit this step.

Micro Mayfly Pattern

Hook:	Dai Riki 075 #14 (TMC2488H would work, original used TMC921)
Thread:	6/0 Danville brown (12/0 Benecchi for smaller sizes, flat thread best)
Bead:	Copper
Tail:	3-4 strands pheasant tail
Rib:	Small copper wire
Abdomen:	Thread (original used stripped peacock herl)
Flashback:	Flashabou
Wingcase:	Mottled turkey tail fibers (treated with fixative or head cement)
Thorax:	Superfine brown dubbing
Legs:	Mottled brown Indian hen saddle
Collar:	Superfine brown dubbing

Place bead on hook, tie in wire and wrap a smooth and even thread base to bend. Tie in 3-4 pheasant tail fibers at the bend, and advance thread to ¼ shank length behind the eye with even wraps to form a smooth abdomen. Trim feather butts, and rib abdomen with 4-5 even wraps of wire. Tie in single strand of Flashabou and a section of mottled turkey at thorax (wingcase about ½ gape in width) before dubbing the thorax with Superfine or similar fine dubbing. Prepare single hen saddle feather by stroking barbules of feather perpendicular to the stem to even the tips (soft-hackle style) before removing a clump from one side of the feather and tying it down on far side of the thorax behind the bead for legs. Length of the legs should be a just bit past the thorax. Repeat for the near side of the hook, before pulling the turkey forward over the thorax. Tie down the turkey, pull the Flashabou forward and tie it down as well, and trim both (an X-Acto knife can be handy here to make a nice clean cut). If you were going to epoxy the wingcase, this is when you would do so (Mercer uses 2 sections for turkey for the wingcase when using epoxy, to prevent seepage). Finally, dub a fine collar behind the bead and whip finish. Pattern is effective in sizes #14-20, with copper or gold beads, copper or gold ribs, in brown, olive, and black. Mercer also ties the Micro Mayfly with wire bodies like a Copper John. A detailed discussion of this and other Mercer patterns can be found in his book *Creative Fly Tying*.
