### <u>Prez Says</u> By Lowell Ashbaugh

I finally had a chance to go fishing last weekend, and had a great time on Lake McCumber. The wind was howling, but the fish were willing so as long as my legs held out I could move my float tube into position and keep catching them. It occurred to me (more than once) that the perfect cast is the enemy of the good enough cast. In a stream or river it's important to get the fly right where it has to go to reach the fish. But in a lake you just need to get it out there and strip it back or troll it. Presentation is more important than position (although you do have to fish where the fish are). I'm getting better about knowing when to let the good enough cast drop and not take that one last back cast to get the fly just a little bit farther out there. I caught more fish with my fly in the water than I did while retrieving my line from that one last "perfect" cast that I failed to deliver! I'm sure there's a life lesson in there somewhere...

### From the CONSERVATION DESK

<u>Conservation Mailing List</u> Water issues continue to top the list of environmental and political concerns in California. If you'd like to get timely notices of conservation issues join the FFD Conservation email list. Go to

http://www2.dcn.org/mailman/listinfo/ffd-conservation to join the group. I promise you won't get a lot of email – just a few important notices each month.

Fishery Groups Intervene in Striped Bass Lawsuit The California Sportfishing Protection Alliance (CSPA), California Striped Bass Association (CSBA) and the Northern California Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers (NCCFFF) have intervened in the lawsuit filed January 29, 2008 by the Coalition for a Sustainable Delta et al. against the California Department of Fish and Game and Fish and Game Commission. The Coalition is largely comprised of Kern County water agencies. That lawsuit accuses the DFG of threatening the existence of endangered salmon and Delta smelt through DFG's striped bass management program. It alleges that striped bass prey on salmon, steelhead and Delta smelt and that predation has illegally contributed to the catastrophic crash of pelagic and salmonid species populations over the last five years. It also alleges fishing regulations established by the Fish and Game Commission results in the take of listed species by striped bass.

The CSPA, CSBA and NCCFFF intervention disputes the Coalition's spurious claims and notes that striped bass populations have plunged to historically low levels over the same period. Resource agency scientific staff maintain that the principal causes of fishery collapse in the Delta are attributed to significantly increased and unsustainable levels water exports, discharges of agricultural, industrial and municipal pollutants and recently introduced species that have changed the composition of the aquatic food web.

"The Coalition's lawsuit is simply an outrageous and transparent effort to divert attention from the real cause of the Delta's decline and blame the victims, instead of the perpetrators," said CSPA Executive Director Bill Jennings. "Striped bass have coexisted with salmon and smelt in the Delta estuary for more than a hundred years. The dramatic almost 30% increase in the amount of water exported in recent years is the one clear culprit that has led to population crashes of numerous species; including salmon, steelhead, striped bass, Delta smelt, longfin smelt, splittail, threadfin shad, among others" he said.

The South Delta Water Agency and Central Delta Water Agency have also filed for intervention in the lawsuit refuting the Coalition's allegations. Their intervention and our intervention will be considered by Judge Oliver Wanger in Fresno on July 14, 2008, along with a motion by State of California to dismiss the lawsuit because of a lack of standing by the plaintiffs.

#### Biological Assessment on CVP OCAP out for Review A

key point has been reached in the process to address current and future operations of the State Water Project (SWP) and the Central Valley Project (CVP) to divert, store, and convey CVP and SWP water consistent with applicable laws and contractual obligations.

The Federal Bureau of Reclamation and the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) are requesting consultation with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) on species listed under the Endangered Species Act. These species consist of the delta smelt, winter-run and spring run Chinook salmon, coho salmon, green sturgeon, steelhead, and killer whales. With the formal request, Reclamation and DWR provided a Biological Assessment, which is intended to provide a thorough analysis of the continued long-term operations of the two projects and the effects of the projects' operations on listed species and designated Critical Habitat.

3rd Annual Spring-run Chinook Symposium The Salmonid Restoration Federation's 3rd Annual Spring-run Chinook Symposium will be held in Nevada City on July 10 followed by field tours on the Yuba River and Butte Creek on July 11 & 12. Symposium presentations include Ecological Perspectives on Spring-run Chinook salmon. Session topics will highlight status of populations and specific recovery opportunities for Central Valley Rivers, and recovery challenges including FERC relicensing, climate change, and resurrecting the Klamath run. Afternoon panels will representatives from DFG, NOAA Fisheries, SYRCL, State Water Board and Conservation Groups will discuss recovery through habitat expansion, water supply, and water quality improvements. Field tours will include a Yuba River float, site visits to the Bear-River Feather Set-back Project by way of the Lower Yuba, a Restoration thru Relicensing Driving Tour, Snorkeling Investigations of the South Yuba River, and a Butte Creek tour of Spring-run Fish Populations. Symposium and field tour costs are \$105-135 depending on advanced registration, which closes on June 15. There's a registration form and schedule of events at

California Supreme Court CALFED Decision

Early this month the California Supreme Court upheld an environmental review of the CALFED management plan, ruling against a coalition of environmental groups, including NCCFFF, that claimed the plan was inadequate because it did not consider an option of reducing water exports. But wording of the decision acknowledged that water exports must be subordinated to environmental needs so the delta may receive some protection from the decision anyway. Much has changed since the original plan was written, and the delta is in much worse shape.

The Planning and Conservation League, a leading statewide conservation advocacy coalition, today issued the following statement from Mindy McIntyre, Water Program Manager.

"Today's decision is a blow to the crumbling Delta ecosystem. The decision is a result of the limited scope of information considered by the Court, which excluded recent scientific evidence documenting the dramatic decline in Delta health related to increasing water diversions. As a result, today's decision condones business-as-usual management practices, which have created the Delta crisis in the first place.

"Today's unfortunate decision relied on the out-dated information on the health of the Bay Delta and the relationship to water exports that was available in 2000. The Court specifically excluded consideration of scientific findings developed since 2000 that demonstrate the link between increased exports and declining fish populations. The legacy of CALFED clearly demonstrates that increased water exports without regard for the environment produces disaster for both the environment and water supply reliability. We must build on what we have learned from that experience and move forward with new Delta management and water policies that avoid disasters such as the current water crisis."

"In the eight years since the CALFED EIR was prepared, we have seen the crash of the Delta smelt and other Delta dependent species, the unprecedented closure of the California salmon fishing season, and a dramatic decline in water supply reliability for those who rely on Delta water. This tragic history clearly dispels the myth that Delta ecosystem restoration can be achieved alongside ever increasing levels of freshwater export. We fully expect that the updated science and lessons learned since 2000 will lead to reduced exports, more sustainable water policies, and better management of the Bay Delta.

"California must act now to secure a water future that is not as heavily dependent on the fragile Bay Delta Estuary. Water legislation introduced this year, including AB 2153 (Krekorian/Hancock) and AB 2175 (Laird/Feuer), support increased development of water recycling, water efficiency, groundwater protection and restoration, and stormwater capture and provide a path to water security for California.

"This Court decision should not be used as an excuse to ignore the impacts of our flawed water policies. We look forward to working with the Governor, legislators, water agencies, businesses, and environmental and environmental justice organizations to implement water policies and actions that are capable of sustaining our people, economy and environment."

How to Fix Environmental Problems California Fish and Game Commissioner Mike Sutton and Martin Goebel, president of Sustainable Northwest in Portland, published a great Op-Ed in the Oregonian on June 6. I would publish it entirely, but have not received permission to do so. The gist of it is that we're spending a lot of resources treating the symptoms of the salmon crash, and rightly so as it has affected livelihoods up and down the coast. But we could do much better by allocating resources to repair the problem. They advocate first to save the rivers that are undammed and pristine – the John Day in Oregon and the Smith in California. They also point out the hard work by disparate interests on the Klamath River and the fresh approaches to the delta suggested by the Delta Vision Blue Ribbon Task Force. They conclude "these promising approaches deserve support from all sides, along with sufficient funding to make a difference. Continuing to treat the latest crisis rather than the underlying problems might be cheaper and more politically feasible in the short run, but in the long run it will prove penny wise and pound foolish. Our salmon and the human and natural communities they support deserve better." I couldn't have said it better. Preserve what you have and restore what you can. Treat the problem and not just the symptoms.

### Fly Fishing the Yellowstone in the Park

Well its summertime and we should all be heading out fishing. I know with gas getting close to \$5 a gallon we may not be going as much as we would like, but you should get on the road and fish someplace special.

The two books I am recommending this month are on a place that is very special to me and a wonderful place to fish. Go to Yellowstone Park! It is about a 13-15 hour drive depending on how many potty and food stops you have to make.

The first book you should read before you go is fly fishing the yellowstone in the park. This book is part of a series form Greycliff River Books where they got a local guide to work with the late Gary LaFontaine to write about their local waters. This book was co-written with Bob Jacklin from West Yellowstone MT.


He covers so many things in this book that if you decide this is the only river you are going to fish in the park you could spend a lot of time doing it. I would not suggest your doing this being there are so many wonderful rivers, streams, and lakes to fish there.

The book walks you through sections of the river. It starts at Yellowstone Lake where the Yellowstone River has its' headwaters and takes you through the estuary, Le Hardy rapids section, Buffalo Ford (where on opening day you can stand elbow-to-elbow with your fellow anglers). He takes you on through the Sulphur Caldrons into the Hayden Valley, passed Alum Creek to the Chittenden Bridge where the river goes over the falls and into the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone. The

journey ends in the Black Canyon area of the park.

He then gets into the seasons on the river. They are broken down into early season, midseason and late season. Read the book to find out what each of these seasons hold.

The rest of the book covers all the "bugs" on the river. Each chapter covers a specific insect, life cycle, and how to fish the patterns. The book has a hatch chart, popular flies, and recipes for 27 key Yellowstone River flies.

The second Yellowstone Park fishing book you must read and take with you when you go is Craig Matthews' and Clayton Molinero's The Yellowstone Fly-Fishing Guide. Craig is the owner with his wife Jackie of Blue Ribbon Flies in West Yellowstone.

This book is a must if you are going to fish the park. When you go make sure the book is in your gear and use it. They cover rivers and lakes; fly hatches and terrestrials, best patterns and the tactics to use. They have broken the park into four sections... Northwest, Northeast, Southeast, and of course Southwest.

As you read through each section the book it covers rivers, streams, ponds and lakes in each area. They tell you what fish you will find in each water if they are any, if you have to hike/backpack in, and if you might run into bears and moose. Each water that has a fish population worth fishing also has suggestions on what sort of flies you should fish. The book is full of maps and great information. Get this book before you go but what every you do...Go to Yellowstone National Park to sight see and for sure FISH!

### Fly of the Month for July Western Coachman

The fly of the month for July will be the western coachman. This fly shares some of the features found in the Elk Hair Caddis and the Prince Nymph. It is little known, but very effective pattern developed by Buz Buszek that can be fished wet or dry.

Hook: Mustad 3399 or R70, TMC 3769 or Daiichi 1560 Size 6-18

Thread: Black 6/0 or 8/0 Tail: Golden Pheasant Tippet

Rib: Gold wire Body: Peacock herl

Hackle: Coachman brown poor quality dry fly hackle or hen Wing: White deer hair from the flank of a white tail deer







First, we fish. Sometimes we even catch..






