CONSERVATION UPDATE By Lowell Ashbaugh

HR1837 Threatens Bay-Delta Protections In his most outrageous performance yet, Congressman Devin Nunes has introduced a new bill that would eliminate or weaken most protections for the collapsing Bay-Delta ecosystem.

HR 1837, the <u>San Joaquin Valley Reliability Act</u>, would completely upend the existing system of environmental safeguards and water rights law. The bill, co-sponsored by Representatives Jeff Denham and Kevin McCarthy, proposes to:

• Shield federal and state contractors who export water from the Delta from any requirements to protect endangered species that are stronger than the Bay-Delta Accord of 1994, which was negotiated before the population collapse of Bay-Delta fisheries beginning in 2000 that led to the adoption of stronger new protections for Chinook salmon, delta smelt, and other species. HR 1837 would jettison these protections, override numerous state and federal environmental laws, shift the burden for protecting the Delta environment and water quality from junior export contractors to more senior water rights holders, and pull the rug out from current efforts to develop a comprehensive ecosystem and water supply solution for the Delta.

- Repeal the historic agreement to restore fisheries and flows to the dewatered <u>San Joaquin River</u> below Friant Dam. HR 1837 would substitute a "restoration" program to release a mere trickle of water – a tiny fraction of what is needed to bring back the river's once great salmon run – and prohibit the state of California from adopting its own restoration requirements.
- Gut key provisions of federal water reform law the Central Valley Project Improvement Act – by blocking the Act's most significant reform, the allocation of 800,000 acre-feet of project supply to ecosystem restoration, unless a substitute supply is provided to contractors by 2016; removing the requirement to use tiered pricing to promote conservation; and putting constraints on the use of the Restoration Fund created to support salmon restoration and other projects.

"If enacted, HR 1837 would have us tackling the looming extinction crisis for the Bay-Delta with little more than a band aid and a get well card," said Gary Bobker, program director at The Bay Institute. "Californians deserve better from their elected officials than recipes for undoing a generation of environmental reforms."

"California continues to face statewide water challenges, but the solution has never been to arbitrarily waive all federal laws, nor is the solution to ignore decades of science," said Senator Dianne Feinstein in a statement issued by her office in response to the introduction of HR 1837.

Fallowed farm acreage on the Westside SJV

California Water Research Associates of Santa Cruz and Restore the Delta of Stockton have released a new paper calling into question the real causes of fallowed farm acreage on the Westside of the San Joaquin Valley.

According to Restore the Delta senior policy analyst Jane Wagner-Tyack, "Reduced water deliveries to the San Joaquin Valley growers are not the primary cause behind fallowed fields. In fact, the majority of San Joaquin Valley lands fallowed starting in 2003 are still fallowed presently, despite west side valley growers receiving 85% of their 2011 water deliveries."

The report, entitled *Mendota: Evidence that soil* and groundwater salinization is the predominant cause of land fallowing, concludes that land and groundwater salinity must be taken into account when one looks at how to ameliorate the effects of long term agricultural unemployment in San Joaquin Valley. <u>Click here</u> to read the report.

Senior researcher Deirdre Des Jardins, of Santa Cruz based California Water Research Associates adds, "Mapping imagery points toward soil and groundwater salinity as the primary cause of land fallowing near Mendota. This evidence, along with record of previous legal settlements, indicates that high levels of unemployment in the Mendota area are more likely the result of land fallowing that occurred prior to the most recent drought than any type of protections set in place for Delta fisheries."

Restore the Delta's Barbara Barrigan-Parrilla explains, "Congressman Devin Nunes's hearing today for his proposed legislation, HR1837, continues the false narrative of how Delta protections have been the major cause behind San Joaquin Valley unemployment. Job losses in the San Joaquin Valley can be attributed to the crash in the housing market, as well as to the removal of lands from agricultural production that cannot be sustained due to drainage problems."

Exporting more and more water from the Delta as proposed in HR 1837 will not solve the drainage problem or the employment problem for the San Joaquin Valley. But exporting more and more water will destroy Delta agriculture and Delta fisheries, thereby creating greater unemployment overall in California.

Herger opposes water bill

Rep. Wally Herger came out against <u>HR 1837</u>, the San Joaquin Valley Water Reliability Act. Critics

said it could have also been called the North State Water *Un*reliability Act, and they apparently got the congressman's attention. Herger is taking a stand contrary to some of the state's most powerful Republicans in this statement:

"After carefully reviewing H.R. 1837 and discussing it with water users in our area, I have strong concerns that the bill, as currently drafted, would negatively impact Northern California water rights and preempt state water law. As I have long stated, California's area of origin protections are clear and unambiguous - our water needs must be met first, before excess water is allowed to flow south.

"I agree with Congressman Nunes' desire to address the ESA-driven water shortages that have needlessly devastated family farmers and the economy of rural California. However, my primary responsibility in Congress is to the North State, and any legislation designed to address these problems must fully protect and respect Northern California's superior water rights.

"Congressman Nunes has committed to work with us to address these legitimate concerns. In addition, the Chairman of the Water and Power Subcommittee, Congressman McClintock, who shares my concerns as well, has committed that he will not move any bill that in any way weakens local area of origin water rights or undermines senior water rights holders."

<u>NCCFFF Report</u> Mark Rockwell

In a recent *Capital Press* Editorial (http://www.capitalpress.com/print/CS-ESApricetag-edit-060311) on the "costs of the Endangered Species Act (ESA)" the Editor attributed not only the need for likely dam removal, but *all the costs of Klamath dam removal* to the Endangered Species Act.

Unfortunately, not only is this blatantly untrue, but this just feeds more misinformation and rumors into efforts by folks like Rep. McClintock to blame the nation's environmental laws for Klamath Dam removal or to otherwise discredit dam removal per the KHSA as unnecessary, also feeding current Congressional efforts to disable these kinds of environmental protections generally -- by implication and innuendo -- as somehow connected to these "massive" costs. Given that Capital Press has a great deal of influence in some of these circles, this unfounded assertion should not go unchallenged.

Both Glen Spain and I are part of a fishing community regulated by the ESA, but both of us felt we had to respond to what is not only a blatant error, but a statement that is likely to be picked up by Settlement opponents and used unfairly in the media rumor mill or in Congress unless quickly rebutted.

This is a "rapid response" LTE to the Capitol Press (attached), we are sending this LTE just submitted to you all to let you know there is at least some response -- though not necessarily the response all on this list might have written -- to the Klamath Settlement-related misstatements in this Capital Press Editorial. Any errors are ours alone.

Whether Capital Press prints it or not is, of course, up to them.

Met an interesting couple of hunters on the hike in, one from Ukraine, the other Moldavian. I tried to interest them in purchase of experienced Russian military binoculars without success.

We made it to 'Big Fish Pond' at about 11 a.m. I caught a small fish on my first cast . . . not THAT unusual when the weather and water are warm. After about 15 minutes Paul caught his first fish, about 14 inches, very nice. I believe he was hooked at this point. About 5 minutes later while fishing the southeast corner of the dam I hooked into the mother of all smallmouth, whooping and hollering I managed to drag it up into the weeds, tried TWICE unsuccessfully to thumb the damn thing, finally had to throw my fish pole down and use BOTH thumbs to lift it up and show Paul. We guesstimated the weight at 4 pounds, as big a smallmouth as I've ever caught. So, there are at LEAST two nice big fish in 'Big Fish Pond'.

We then hiked over to 'Brophy Pond' where Paul proceeded to administer a lesson in fish catching. Using an olive woolly-bugger and sink-tip line he was catching fish on EVERY SINGLE CAST. Out of frustration I finally threw my pole down, walked around to where he was fishing and broke both of his thumbs to equalize the situation. It was obscene. He must have caught 40 fish. Reminded me of Bob Brodberg last fall doing his 'Japanese industrial tuna fisherman' thing.

Book of the Month By Jim Luschwitz


"At The Grave of the Unknown Fisherman"

By John Gierach

Just when you thought America's favorite trout bum had gone on too many fishing trips and was tardy from his word processor, he comes out with another charming series of personal fishing lore. Gierach stands in a class by

himself. Not the sort of writer to bore us with technique (Lord knows, we have enough books to keep us well educated for another half century) Gierach instead gives us a delightful mixture of good humor and fun as he reflects on a single year's worth of fine and not-so-fine fishing season, from the raw beginnings of early spring to an iffy New Year's Eve float.

However, this is not just a regurgitation of his fishing journal. Sometimes a current fishing trip is disposed of in a few sentences which then serve as a launching pad into a long discussion of some aspect of fly fishing. The details and experiences accumulate, and while you could read the chapters out of sequence and still make sense of it all, the book takes on more meaning when read from first page to last.



In the progress of the season, Gierach reveals a few more personal details than in previous books. For example, his fans will recall how Gierach lived across the street from a trout stream in a simple house (imagined to be a quaint log

> cabin) heated by a wood stove. It may have seemed idyllic and even enviable to his readers.

However, in this new book we find that the trout stream's gotten crowded, the fishing's gone to hell, and a landowner has put up "No Trespassing" signs on the best parts. Further, his house was at one time the cheapest dwelling in the county (read: run-down, not quaint log cabin) and is inexorably falling into rot and ruin because Gierach is into fly fishing, not house maintenance.

This book, more so than his past books, gives us glimpses into Gierach's perspective on the philosophy, sociology and politics of fishing. You never get too much fishing strategy from this trout bum. This book is for those who simply

want to be entertained while educated on appropriate attitudes toward the sport.
