

While not exactly why this column surfaced, this seems to be a good place to report on the Amador trip. The breakfast was perhaps the day's high point with the grease flowing freely and the portions generous to obscene. After that we did go fishing. Results varied, but most of the fish were 17-20 inches. A new tactic showed up which is to fish virtually on the shore about 3 feet under an indicator with #14 Copper Johns, etc. This method clearly was the most effective one on this day.

Delta Striper Win We had a big win on the proposed Striped Bass regulation change this month (see the November 2011 newsletter for details). Several hundred people attended the Fish and Game Commission meeting on February 2, and nearly everyone who spoke was opposed to the change. The only people who spoke in favor were those who were paid by the water contractors to support their cause.

I delivered the 70 postcards signed by our club members the day before and briefly spoke to the commission. After all the public testimony was given, each commissioner had something to say. Ultimately, they voted unanimously to reject the proposed change!

Save the Date The third Trinity River Restoration Program Science Symposium will be held in Weaverville, California, during the week of January 7, 2013. The event will be a forum for strategic planning for the Trinity River based on the outcomes of the Phase I Review and other timely results from 2012 studies. The symposium will serve as a foundation for improving the quality of future management decisions based on up-to-date scientific findings. More detailed information on the symposium will be shared in the coming months.

<u>California water bill in the works</u> Republican lawmakers, led by Rep. Tom McClintock, R-Elk Grove, have been quietly overseeing the rewrite of a huge California water bill since last summer. The bill could shape everything from the San Joaquin River to Sacramento Valley water deliveries.

This bill will be a follow-up to the HR 1837 legislation that Nunes and others in the Valley put forward last June. That bill had significant pushback from valley and Foothill water districts as it over-rode area of origin water rights, and usurped state water rights. It also had lots of over-rides on the Endangered Species Act section 7 Biological Opinions for Delta Smelt and Salmon/Steelhead, as well as blocking the San Joaquin River settlement. It was a bad bill then, and is likely to be a bad bill again for the Delta and fishery.

Sustainability Forum on Water and the Delta For

the first time, proponents and opponents of the State's plans to transform the San Joaquin-Sacramento Delta will discuss the merits and drawbacks of the Delta Plan and the peripheral canal. The forum is scheduled Saturday, March 3, 2012 at the Civic Auditorium in Stockton, and is open to the general public.

The purpose of this forum is to inform and explain to all residents in the Delta region the scope and impact of changes that may forever alter the unique features of the Delta by redefining the character and future growth of communities that lie within the region, by eliminating family farms operating within the Delta, and by altering the fabric of life enjoyed by Delta residents.

"A Primer on Water and the Delta" is the first of three forums that are being hosted by the same coalition of environmental advocates, private business and local government that held community forums the past two years on how to employ sustainable practices in everyday life. Members of the coalition are the Sierra Club, Campaign for Common Ground, the A.G. Spanos Companies, the Stockton City Council and the San Joaquin Council of Governments.

"Water is vital to our local economy, our farms, and our cities. As residents of the region and stewards of this unique estuary and habitat to many species, it is important that we stay informed and alert to insure that we retain local control over our water and our future," said Susan Eggman City Council Member.

Presentations at the forum will be made by Dr. Jerry Meral, Deputy Secretary for the California Natural Resources Agency; Jason Peltier, Chief Deputy General Manager, Westlands Water District; Jim Fiedler, Chief Operating Officer, Santa Clara Valley Water District; Ann Johnston, Mayor of Stockton and Chair for the Delta Coalition; John Herrick, an expert on local water issues; Jeff Michael, Director of the Business Forecasting Center, University of the Pacific; and Barbara Barrigan-Parilla, Executive Director of Restore the Delta.

The forum will begin at 8:30 a.m. and conclude at 12:00 noon. Each presentation will be followed by a question and answer period. Moderator for the entire series will be Susan Eggman, a City Council Member of the City of Stockton and Professor of Social Work at the California State University at Sacramento.

Members of the organizing committee are Dale Stocking, Sierra Club; Eric Parfrey, Campaign for Common Ground; Councilwoman Susan Eggman, Stockton City Council; Natalia Orfanos, A.G. Spanos Companies; and Andrew Chesley, Executive Director of the San Joaquin Council of Governments.

Sierra Trout Camp Trout Unlimited of California is holding its first Sierra Trout Camp for middle schoolage boys and girls on June 15-17, 2012 at the UC Berkeley Sagehen Creek Field Station located just 10 miles north of Truckee, CA.

This is the most accessible and technical youth fly fishing camp in California, giving students an experience in fly tying and fly fishing, and starting their journey to a lifetime of outdoor pursuits. Sierra Trout Camp is designed to give kids an awareness, appreciation and understanding of the importance of our nation's aquatic resources with an emphasis on conservation, protection and restoration of coldwater ecosystems. Participants will also learn about stream ecology, cutthroat trout restoration, stream physics and chemistry, fishing etiquette and aquatic entomology. They will also do some hiking and swimming.

The UC Berkeley Sagehen Creek Field Station is located on the banks of Sagehen Creek, a coldwater stream containing wild brook, brown and rainbow trout. Facilities include a dormitory, dining hall, classrooms, outdoor meeting shelters, and full-time professional staff.

Sierra Trout Camp 2012 will begin at noon on Friday, June 15, and end at 5 p.m. on Sunday, June 17. Girls and boys 9-14 years of age as of June 15 are eligible. Trout Unlimited will accept a total of 15 participants. Tuition is \$150, and insurance coverage is provided by UC Berkeley Sagehen Creek Field Station.

Youngsters interested in attending Sierra Trout Camp 2012 must complete an application form, available at <u>http://www.tucalifornia.org/TUCA_CMS/</u>.

Applications are now being accepted and must be submitted no later than April 1, 2012; selections will be made by April 22nd, 2012. Applications should be mailed or e-mailed or sent to David Lass; <u>dlass@tu.org</u>; 10356 Donner Pass Rd. STE B, Truckee, CA 96161.

When families are notified that their child has been selected, they will be provided with a UC Berkeley waiver and liability form that they must fill out and send back to Trout Unlimited.

From the NCCFFF By Cindy Charles

Santa Clara Creek Mondy Lariz has been our representative in the Santa Clara County Environmental Coalition for Living Streams, working to get the Santa Clara Valley Water District to restore steelhead in the creek via FAHCE (Fisheries & Aquatic Habitat Collaborative Effort). Mondy has recently stepped down and the NCCFFF has accepted the pro bono offer by Richard McMurtry to represent it in continuing this work with me involved as time permits. Richard is retired from the Regional State Water Control Board and has been the Program Coordinator for several years with the Santa Clara Creeks Coalition. He has been involved in this project for many years.

Recently, with approvals, the Northern California Council Federation of Fly Fishers became a member of the Santa Clara County Environmental Coalition for Living Streams. The Coalition is the successor to the Santa Clara County Creeks Coalition. That Coalition was made up of NCCFFF, the Audubon Society and the Committee for Green Foothills. Two changes have occurred that require a new coalition to continue the advocacy efforts for streams begun by the Santa Clara County Creeks Coalition. One was the election of Brian Schmidt of the Committee for Green Foothills to the Board of the Santa Clara Valley Water District, thereby creating a potential conflict of interest between Brian's role with the Creeks Coalition Advocacy and his role with the Water District. Second was a decision of Audubon Society to focus its efforts on bird issues, rather than creeks issues. The Creeks Coalition is therefore scaling back its efforts and focusing on its annual creeks conference.

This is occurring at a critical time in the environmental community's ability to influence the Santa Clara Valley Water District's proposed \$430 million Special Tax for Water Supply, Flood Control and Wildlife Habitat. So we are undertaking to create a new Creeks Coalition to focus on getting the Water District to commit on the order of 35% of its tax measure to Stream Restoration with a focus on anadromous fish restoration and health of the watershed.

Thanks to Mondy for his years of tireless work on this important project!!

Hal Janson

To be the 34th inductee into the NCCFFF Fly Fishing Hall of Fame

Hal Janssen is a nationally known writer, artist, lecturer, and video personality. He has been fly fishing for over 50 years in both fresh and saltwater for nearly every species of fish all over the globe. He was adopted by the Golden Gate Casting and Angling Club at a young age. They set him up with a "shooting head" and taught him how to cast. Growing up in the 50's Hal is one of the "Rivers of the Lost Coast " greats.

Hal is one of a few special people in the world with naturally polarized eyes. This allows him to see better and quickly analyze stream conditions therefore adding to his ability to perform as one of the great world class anglers.

Hal has made numerous contributions to the evolution of modern fly lines. Hal, along with Leon Martuch, has been responsible for developing Scientific Anglers wet-tip fly line. He and John Agnew worked on the



development of the first tapered lead core line and the invention of the density compensated uniform sink line. His list of accomplishments to the improved products used in our sport are too great to list here.

Today, Hal has over 70 fly patterns that are distributed worldwide. He has written numerous articles for leading fly fishing magazines. Produced several fly fishing videos and contributed to many books as both artist and author.

His accomplishments go on and on, too numerous to list here. We look forward to hearing his comments on March 10, 2012 as Hal is inducted into the Northern California Council of the Federation of Fly Fishers Hall of Fame. Please join us for this exciting evening of recognition for one of the GREATS in our sport of fly fishing.

Book of the Month

"Dave Whitlock's Guide to Aquatic Trout Foods"

Let me say this right away: this is an outstanding book. Some may argue that it is not the best -- I wouldn't know, I haven't read them all. But it sure is a fine book.

For people who are fairly new to stream fishing and fly

tying, this book puts a lot of stuff in its right place. We've all heard the words; spinner, emerger, caddises, mayflies and so on, but I'd bet that a lot of you never really could find your way in all these terms and their proper use and their fly counterparts.

If you not nearly sure about what to use or how to fish it at a certain stream under certain conditions. This book will fill some large holes.

The book is actually quite systematic. Dave Whitlock deals with all important fresh water trout food species; from mayflies, caddisflies and stoneflies to fish, scuds, shrimps and leeches. Every group is described in detail: life cycle, which is very important to understand -- especially when it comes to insects, morphology, habitus and how to

imitate them. Concerning imitations Dave Whitlock deals with the flies as well as tactics. This is a great advantage to people who can tie a stream fly from description, but only rarely know how to fish it.

The book starts out with a general overview of the concept of imitating followed by a chapter on 'water'. This again is followed by a large chapter on the morpholgy, physiology and life of the trout itself. This

chapter can seem a bit intimidating, but skip it if you're not comfortable with the 'scienctific stuff' and return to it later. The fly chapters are much more easlily read.

The patterns are all fairly simple and easy to tie. There's typically one pattern for each stage of each group of animals. Some flies are presented with two different patterns using different materials or techniques. All the drawing are a treat: nice to look at and very informative.

Also the book is printed on a large format paper, so there's lots of room for large and clear drawings.

My conclusion is: if you're new in this stream fishing game, get this book. It's a great source of systematic info on trout food. It contains a balanced text

on all important issues: feeding habits, life cycles, imitations and equipment and strategies. It's a highly usefull book, both for general reading and as a systematic handbook.


