"North Coast Steelhead"



The rivers of California's North Coast are some of the most famous winter steelhead waters in the world and are where targeting steelhead on the fly began. In the last 10 years restrictions on logging, eliminating hatcheries, and 100 percent catch and release on all wild steelhead are among the leading factors that have successfully rehabilitated these rivers. These rivers not only boast healthy returns of wild steelhead but also offer spectacular scenery. There is no better backdrop when fishing than Emerald green waters lined by giant California Redwoods. Winter steelheading is not for the faint of heart. We are searching for a grab or two per day. While this is not a

numbers game, these fish are usually chrome bright and full of fight. These fish average 7-8 lbs,

with fish in the mid to high teens hooked each season. Every cast lends the opportunity of landing the fish of a lifetime!

Jason Hartwick was born and raised in Sacramento, CA and have been fly fishing for over 17 years. He attended the University of Texas on a golf scholarship and pursued professional golf for four years after school. While he grew up playing golf and trying to make a career out of it, he spent most of his youth fishing the rivers of California's Central Valley for trout and steelhead. He hooked his first steelhead on the American River and has been crazy about them ever since. Although he grew up in Sacramento, he considers the Trinity River his home river. He has been fly fishing the Trinity River watershed for over 11 years in summer, fall, and winter. What drew him to this river is the variety of steelhead fishing it provides all anglers throughout the year.





While he has been an avid steelheader for many years, he has been even more excited about steelheading since he started fishing two handed (spey) rods 11 years ago. Spey rods not only make steelhead fishing much more enjoyable, but a heck of a lot easier. Not only can you cast further with ease but the two handed rod makes mending a breeze! Part of his love of fishing the two handed rod is teaching others to cast and fish them as well. If you have not experienced steelhead fishing with a spey rod, Jason suggests you give it a try. Go for the grab!

CONSERVATION UPDATE By Lowell Ashbaugh

Suction Dredge Update The statutory moratorium on in stream suction dredge mining in California and the issuance of related permits by the Department remains in effect. (Fish & G. Code, § 5653.1.) This is true even though the Department adopted new regulations governing its permitting program and the Office of Administrative Law approved those regulations in April 2012. You can access those regulations at http://www.dfg.ca.gov/suctiondredge/. The statutory moratorium overrides the new regulations and the authority of the Department to sell suction dredge permits.

The moratorium, as updated with the enactment of SB 1018 in June 2012, directs the Department to take specific actions and submit a related report to the California Legislature on or before April 1, 2013.

The Department has begun its effort to comply with this requirement and expects to submit its report to the Legislature on schedule. It seems reasonable to assume the Legislature will take no further action related to suction dredging under the Fish and Game Code until the Department submits its report next spring. The Department assumes for the same reason that the current moratorium will remain in effect until at least that time.

Related litigation continues. Six of thirteen actions filed against the Department since May 2005 remain pending. A recent court order directs and authorizes the Presiding Judge in San Bernardino County Superior Court to assign a trial judge in San Bernardino County to oversee and address all six pending actions as a single, coordinated proceeding. The Department expects no developments in the litigation until the assigned trial court judge holds an initial case management conference in the coordinated proceedings at some time in the next couple of months. The Department cannot predict when or how the Court will rule on any of the challenging issues before it.

Trinity County Opposes BDCP The Board of Supervisors of Trinity County recently adopted a "Position of Opposition to the Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) to construct a major isolated water conveyance system in the Delta and move additional Northern California water south of the Delta." The resolution describes the process whereby the BDCP is

being developed as governmentally, economically, and scientifically flawed, notably because it does not provide clear, specific, and measureable objectives, lacks a cost benefit analysis, lacks a comprehensive socio-economic evaluation of the cumulative impact of the plan on all of California, and contains little analysis of public trust resource values, including: fisheries, within the Trinity River watershed. It also notes Trinity County is a county of origin, and that the BDCP would allow water users to sell "so-called surplus Public Trust water for private profit" without regard for Trinity County. Finally, it points out that the recreational impact on Trinity County of the loss of water to the Central Valley adversely affects the local fisheries, jobs, property values, and population.

Klamath Basin Restoration Agreement The Klamath Basin Restoration Agreement will expire on December 31 unless 42 stakeholders agree to extend it until 2014. Although most stakeholders appear to be in favor of extending it, there are vocal opponents who would like to end it.

Some of the opposition stems from the split between irrigators on the upper river and tribes and fish advocates on the lower river. The Hoopa Valley Tribe, in particular, has expressed strong opposition to the process.

The Humboldt County Board of Supervisors approved an extension to the KBRA recently, one of six stakeholders who have done so.

One argument to abandon the KBRA holds that there is already a process in place to remove dams on the Klamath. This argument relies on the Federal Energy Relicensing Commission (FERC) to require dam removal. Historically, though, FERC has never required dam removal against the wishes of the dam owner.

A strong argument in favor of the KBRA is that it requires more than just dam removal. It also contains restoration, water quality, and water reliability plans that would ensure returning salmon would encounter far better conditions than they do today. Simply removing the dams would not necessarily improve water conditions to benefit the fish.

It appears a major complaint of the opponents to the agreement is that there has been insufficient access to the process of creating it. It's unclear whether that's really the case, but most opponents really want to fix the problems with the river but do not believe the current agreement is the best way to do it. All agree that the continued fighting results in only one thing – Pacificorp continues operating and the river suffers.

Fly Tying Corner

Luk Lake

One of my favorite Fly Fishers of Davis outings is Luk Lake. This year's outing takes place on Friday Nov. 30th and Saturday Dec. 1st. Check with Dana Hooper about the availability of this terrific outing, as it usually fills up fast.

Luk Lake is a 65+ acre lake conveniently located just minutes from Interstate 5 in Corning, California, behind the Rolling Hills Casino. The lake's varied shoreline is lined with vegetation and flanked by the rolling golden hillsides of the Central Valley. Its low-elevation location keeps the lake waters (and outside air temperatures) moderate and comfortable throughout the winter and spring, providing ideal habitat for rainbow trout until the water temperatures grow too warm in the summertime. All year, however, Luk Lake exemplifies ideal bass habitat. It's not at all uncommon to land trophy sized bass, sunfish, and rainbow trout all in the same day at Luk Lake!

Trout fishermen find that fishing small midge dry flies can be productive throughout the wintertime, as well as dead drifting midge patterns under indicators. Stripping small streamers and damselfly nymphs can be very productive, and also creates opportunities to catch bass. In the warmer months, fishing damselfly adults, dragonflies, frogs, mice, and bass poppers can all be productive for the lake's bigger bass. If you're interested in catching large (5+ pounds) rainbow trout, its best to visit this valley gem after it is stocked around the first week of November each year. It can fish very well all through the winter months and into late spring, as long as the water temps don't get too warm.

As with any pay-to-play venue, fly selection may not be of utmost concern and you can enjoy experimenting with different presentations and fly patterns. One such wet fly pattern that has worked very well for me at Luk Lake is the **Hale Bopp Leech**, stripped medium fast on a type 3 or Intermediate line in the deeper parts of the lake. I started using this pattern more and more over the past few years, my preference over the plain old, boring Wooly Bugger pattern of years past. I have used the Hale Bopp Leech successfully on many Northern California still waters with very good success; Lake Almanor, Fall River, Fuller Lake, and Baum Lake to name a few.

Hale Bopp Leech Materials List:

Hook Long-Shank Curved Nymph, size 6-10 Weight Optional; bead or lead-free wire wrapped on shank Thread Red 6/0 Tail Marabou - brown over black, or olive

Flashabou - electric blue, lime green or red (optional) Butt Hackle Hen Cape – tan, brown or olive

Body Blended olive green or black leech dubbing Hackle Brown/grizzly neck or similar

To tie, slide a bead on the hook or wrap the hook shank with lead-free wire (0.25 preferred). Tie in the tail using first a small bundle of black marabou, then an equal amount of brown marabou, and then 4 strands of flashabou (optional). The tail should be slightly longer than the hook. At the butt of the shank tie in a hen back hackle, wrap around the shank twice and secure. Pinch the quills to make them lay back toward the tail. Form a dubbing loop just in front of the tail. Using a long fibered





dubbing (e.g., leech dubbing) secure the dubbing in the loop by twisting loop and then wrap the body forward toward the eye and secure. Be sure to tease out the long fibers as these will give the fly more motion in the water. To complete the fly tie in a large neck hackle just behind the eye. The quills should be about half as long as the hook. Make 3-5 wraps of the hackle and secure. Pinch the hackle quills back and slightly overwrap the hackles while forming the thread head, then whip finish and apply head cement. Tight lines!

Variations: There are many variations of the Hale Bopp: bead head or not; weighted or not, common colors include black, olive and brown.

Vessel Assist Costs Dearly By Donn Erickson

Joe Melendres and I were on the Delta fishing for stripers Nov 1, when my boat engine died (seems that it is something to do with the alternator). We banged around for a while, and when it was apparent that we were not going to get the motor started and no were boats going by, we called Vessel Assist for a tow. There are 2 locations on the delta; you can get them by calling the national number, or the sheriff will hook you up. We had an exciting tow back to Pirates Lair going about 30 MPH. The hourly rate is \$250/hr during the day and \$300 at night. They charge from the time they leave their dock to time of return. Charge came to \$570!

They mentioned that they offered an insurance policy that cost about \$50 per year and completely covered the cost of a tow. I checked with my insurance company (Progressive) and found I did not have insurance to cover the tow. A \$500 limit costs \$27 per year and a \$1,000 limit costs about \$45 per year. I signed up for the \$500.

Introductory fly tying classes will begin Tuesday January 15 and continue on January 17 & 22. This Tuesday, Thursday Tuesday format is limited to 10 participants. The class covers the tying basics and allows the participant to decide whether they would benefit from the additional techniques and patterns covered in the intermediate class.


