His enthusiasm for the sport is contagious and combined with his simple approach to teaching gives students the skills needed to be successful. Moved by all things flora and fauna his passion for the natural world is never ending. His locations for guiding include Lake Davis, the Wild & Scenic Middle Fork Feather River, Frenchman's Reservoir, Eagle Lake, the North Fork Yuba River, Lake Almanor, The Big & Little Truckee Rivers, The Lower Yuba, and many secluded creeks in Eastern Plumas Co. Jon's philosophy on fly fishing is to keep it simple, be confident in your presentation, and have fun! His favorite game is stalking and sight fishing to large trout in shallow water, whether it is a river or a stillwater.


The Prez Sez

Paul Berliner has produced a new video program again this year, and if you recall from past years it was one of the highlights of the dinner.


Again, make sure you mark this date on your calendar and please attend as this is FFD's only fundraiser during the year

FLY TYER'S CORNER

February 28 through March 3 is the Baum Lake outing this year. A cold weather camp will be located at the PG&E campground in Cassel. The campground is officially closed but camping is permitted. There are pit toilets available but no running water. Fish Meister Boyden will be assigning potluck duties soon for the group dinners each evening. We are on our own for breakfast and lunch.

If you are wondering what fly to use let me tell what I discovered two years ago:

Weather for the March 2011 Baum Lake outing was not great. It was drizzling rain, freezing cold and fishing was not what we expect at Baum. We were catching fish but not the rapid-fire hook-ups common in March.

Cary was fishing his usual set-up: an Ice Cream Cone and a Zebra Midge under an indicator. Dana was stripping a Hale-Bopp leach. Gene was swinging a small brown soft hackle. The late Mark Latham was drifting size 22 green scuds and I was swinging a Tabou Caddis. Five or six other club members were using their favorite patterns and we were all catching fish, but like I said, it was not what we expect in March.

While we were catching the occasional fish I noticed a bank fisherman getting a hook-up almost every cast. After an hour or so of watching him hook and land fish after fish I rowed over, introduced myself, and asked what the ???? he was using. His name was Roy Powell and he was on his way to participate in an Oregon Fishing Show as a guest fly tier. He showed me a small black fly and then went to his car. He was leaving, and gave me a couple of the killer patterns. He said it was in development and did not have a name yet. I thanked him and quickly put one away to copy later. I tied the other gift fly on, rowed back out, landed six or seven nice browns and then broke off. I started to go to the car to get the other fly but resisted and waited until I could get back home to my vice.

On the 2012 Baum trip I used this fly exclusively and whacked em. I'm sold!!! I call it the "*Baum Bomb*". (don't know what Roy calls it)

RECIPE

- Hook Mustad 94840, Tiemco 100, or equivalent, size 16-20
- Thread 8/0 black Uni-Thread
- Bead Small Clear
- Body Tying Thread
- Rib Small Silver Wire (French Tinsel best)
- Gills White Ostrich Herl
- Thorax Fine Black Dubbing

TYING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. De-barb hook and slip on bead. Place hook in vice.
- 2. Start thread behind hook eye and tie in Ostrich Herl.
- 3. Make two but not more than three turns of herl. Secure gills with two or three turns with whip finisher and cut thread. (Too much thread will interfere with sliding bead behind hook eye).
- 4. Slide bead to just behind hook eye forcing gills forward over hook eye.
- 5. Restart thread behind bead.
- 6. Tie in rib behind bead and wind thread back to just over hook barb. This should secure the rib all along hook shank.
- 7. Make even wraps of thread back to the thorax area behind bead.
- 8. Make five counter wraps of rib material to just behind bead and tie off. (5th wrap will be covered with dubbing).
- 9. Dub small thorax and whip finish.
- 10. Apply small amount of Sally's Hard as Nails to body.

Eight to nine foot rods in 4-5-6 weights are perfect combined with a floating line, a 9' leader and 5x tippet. Use a strike indicator just large enough to float the flies. Tie on with a non-slip loop knot and fish the *Baum Bomb* as the bottom fly. An extremely slow hand twist retrieve is very effective.

Delta Whopper: How Big Water Spins the Science on Water Policy *By Zeke Grader*

Fishermen are my constituents - I work with them every day. And when you hang around fishermen, you hear a lot of fish stories. Sometimes, of course, you hear some real whoppers, yarns that stretch the credulity of even the most trusting soul. But nothing I've heard on the docks can match the whoppers that originate from Sacramento.

Perhaps the most egregious falsehood comes courtesy of Big Water - the state's largest water districts and agencies, including Kern County, the Westlands Water District and the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California.

Big Water maintains a formidable presence in our state capitol, furiously lobbying our representatives to divert more and more water from our beleaguered Bay/Delta to the south state. Never mind that the Bay/Delta is the largest and most biologically productive estuary on the west coast of the Americas, and that it constitutes a crucial nursery and staging area for an array of commercially important fish and shellfish species, including Chinook salmon, Dungeness crab and Pacific herring. And never mind that the science community is in broad agreement that estuaries need abundant quantities of fresh water flowing through them to remain healthy.

Big Water has its own skewed and self-serving perspective. It claims they can pump ever-increasing volumes of Sacramento River and San Joaquin River water from the Delta without adversely affecting our fisheries. Further, they have the gall to claim that science supports their position.

Don't buy it. They're lying, pure and simple.

When the Bush Administration approved rules that allowed greater Delta pumping, Big Water danced a jig in celebration. These standards allowed water projects to seize up to 70 percent of the Delta's spring flows. It wasn't much of a surprise, then, when the estuary's ecosystem collapsed, sending our salmon into a death spiral. For the first time in history, the state closed the salmon season. Big Water's decidedly disingenuous response? It wasn't water diversions causing the problem. It was - well, everything except diversions. Contaminants, ocean conditions, non-native predatory fish, aliens from the planet Mongo - you name it.

Scientific peer reviews of the Bush pumping rules revealed their deep flaws, and a federal court threw them out. The court and federal agencies imposed new, stronger rules that were upheld by the National Research Council. But did Big Water take the opportunity to get behind this real science? Uh - no. In fact, they sued to block the new standards. And today, they're still agitating for a return to the old pumping levels, despite the fact that the scientific community is unified in opposing them, including analyses by the US EPA and the State Water Resources Control Board.

Big Water's latest ploy is pushing wetland restoration projects in the Delta to justify excessive pumping. They're still pushing this proposal, despite analyses from the state and federal agencies showing that this scheme could ultimately result in salmon extinction, not recovery. Don't get me wrong - I support wetland restoration, in the Delta and elsewhere. But a few new wetlands are no substitute for adequate through-estuary flows of fresh water. Big Water seems incapable of grasping this simple biological fact. Or rather, they know only too well they're peddling the Big Lie - but they want what they want, and they won't stop until they get it.

Their strategy is clear - control the Bay/Delta Conservation Plan that is now evolving by exerting control over agency science programs. They want to determine the questions the scientific community asks, interpret their results and influence how these findings are translated into pumping limits. Their new mantra is "collaborative science." That sounds good on the face of it - but it's just another whopper. Science is not a consensus political process. It is a search for truth, not something to be "cooked."

In any rigorous scientific inquiry, the facts must speak for themselves. And the facts in this case are unequivocal and explicit: we cannot deprive the Delta estuary of significant freshwater flows if we want to save our fisheries and wildlife. Big Water's call for "collaboration" is nothing more than a stalking horse for muzzling scientists and jacking up water diversions for a handful of San Joaquin Valley megafarms.

There are a lot of stakeholders in the Bay/Delta process. Bay Area urbanites, Delta farmers, senior

water rights holders on the Sacramento River - all have a crucial interest in the way this plays out. But no one has a bigger stake than California's salmon fishermen. Our very livelihood depends on a healthy Bay-Delta, the nursery for most of the state's salmon. Without a functioning estuary, our salmon runs will disappear. That will doom our industry, and it will also have dire consequences for restaurants, seafood processors, and fish wholesalers and retailers - not to mention the millions of consumers who demand fresh, local, healthful salmon.

Big Water has fooled us before, and now they're running a new con. But as The Who so eloquently put it, we won't get fooled again. We wouldn't let Big Tobacco control the science on cigarettes and cancer, and we wouldn't let Big Oil control the science on atmospheric carbon levels and global warming. We can't let Big Water control scientific research in the Bay-Delta.

Zeke Grader is the Executive Director of the Pacific Coast Federation of Fishermen's Associations in San Francisco. He has served as the president of the western region of the old National Federation of Fishermen and the West Coast Fisheries Development Foundation, and he currently serves on the board of directors of the Marine Fish Conservation Network.

Restore the Delta Responds to Tunnel Issues Barbara Barrigan-Parrilla, executive director of RTD, said, responded to the State Water Contractors comparison of the proposed BDCP Dual Tunnel and the proposed alternative single tunnel, saying "The water contractors cannot afford to pay for the proposed twin tunnels unless they pass the exorbitant costs on to urban water rate payers. San Joaquin Valley farmers cannot afford to farm with water that will cost up to \$2000 per acrefoot. And Southern California urban water users would be expected to pay thousands of dollars more per household without receiving an extra drop of water.

"The proposed single tunnel project, at half the cost for a third of the water, pencils out to be an even worse deal economically for urban rate payers and San Joaquin Valley agribusiness.

"The real answer is: First, make investments in regional water independence as proposed by NRDC and other environmental groups, by implementing hundreds of small projects that will make more water. Second, improve Delta levees so that a safe yield of Delta water can be shared in a reliable manner. Third, screen and reconfigure the existing pumps. This is how we can actually create *more* water through a much more reasonable form of public investment," said Barrigan-Parrilla.

In response to the Administration's proposed water diversion proposal, Barrigan-Parrilla said, "Time and time again, the best available Delta science has shown that Delta Smelt and other threatened fish species are on the brink of collapse due to *too much water being taken* out of the Delta. In the face of the threatened extinction of fish species, the Brown Administration has presided over record-high water exports. Where was their deep concern for the Delta smelt, salmon and other species during the past two years? The Peripheral Tunnel proponents are proposing a new diversion for one purpose: get the Peripheral Tunnels built ASAP.

"For state officials to say that changing the diversion point is to protect Delta smelt, and not simply to provide more water for export, is disingenuous. The water-takers have failed for decades to install fish screens that work. Why would we believe their new Peripheral Tunnels would properly screen fish? The technology for the fish screens to be placed at the new diversion point has not yet been developed. How can the Administration advocate that changing the diversion point with new intakes is the silver bullet to help Delta smelt, when they don't know if it will work? In addition, they don't know if fish can recover and survive when passing three large intakes.

"There are laws that must be followed. Officials cannot simply change the diversion point for Delta exports. They will have to move through processes with the State Water Resources Control Board, and show that this change will not have an adverse impact on Delta communities."

Book of the Month By Jim Luschwitz "Trout Hunter" By Rene Harrop

Like I suspect many flyfishers will, I was drawn to a fly fishing title that supports my own interests as not just a fisher but a hunter of trout. René Harrop presents his remarkable journey across a career as writer, fly tier, guide and fisher of large trout.

Thankfully, unlike many authors who are experts in

this or that aspect of fly fishing, Harrop doesn't intimidate us with scientific nomenclature. He makes it clear that you don't have to be an entomologist to advance as a flyfisher, to excel, or to even become the FFD guru. You need to elevate your powers of observation; that is, you need to match your fishing skills to what you are learning on the water. This is precisely what Harrop gives us--insights and tools to help us see and respond to the flyfishing adventure before us.

Harrop's writing sneaks up on you. I found myself enjoying a little narration, and before long I found myself immersed in a great learning experience. His chapter on fishing in the wind is a wonderful narrative of how facing adversity teaches many things about fishing under more favorable conditions.

One of the lessons you walk away with is that when

you focus on the single most important thing (the perspective of the trout), details of presentation and fly construction will fall into place. Not that fly construction and presentation aren't important, but that performance in these areas will increase to the degree that you can place yourself in the fins of the fish for a few moments each time you fish.

Get your nose closer to the water, Harrop might say if he were fishing next to you. And if it gets a little wet, that's a small price to pay for getting closer to the trout's perspective on bugs and on the flies that fool them.


