In 1996 he moved to Northern Calfornia where he continues to guide year around up to 270 days a year. Mike has a relentless passion for fly fishing the California Delta. Most of his days are spent chasing stripers, largemouth bass, and smallmouth bass with a fly rod. Mike also drifts the Stanislaus River, the Mokelumne River, and the Lower Sacramento River, for trout and steelhead. He has been featured on ESPN's Destination Outdoors and Fly Fishing America. Mike is also the author of the book, Fly Fishing The California Delta, a 200 page fly fishing book, complimented by amazing photography by Simms Rep, John Sherman. Mike resides in Woodbridge, California, with his wife, Emene, and son, Connor.





Action Alert! The most important single thing you can do in the next few days is to submit a comment on the California Water Fix, otherwise known as the twin tunnels (or in an earlier incarnation the peripheral canal). The comment period closes on October 30.

It's really important to submit comments on this - there will be no vote on this project as there was when Californians soundly rejected the peripheral canal, which this project replicates (only underground where we won't see it). The best way to comment is to write an individual letter, but if you can't take the time to do that you can at least sign a petition. Do both if you can, but if you're at all serious about our sport of fly fishing take some time and write a letter. Restore The Delta has all the tools and information you need for personalizing your letter at http://restorethedelta.org/take-action-oppose-the-deltatunnels/. This could be the most important act you can take to protect fisheries in California. And make no mistake, this project would affect fisheries far beyond the delta. I've written about this before, but if you need a refresher I've added a little background information below. There's also much more at Restore The Delta. Please take action now!

The Bay Delta Conservation Plan (BDCP) was created in response to the dual goals defined by the California Legislature in the Delta Reform Act of 2009; i.e. to provide a more reliable water supply for California and to protect, restore, and enhance the Delta ecosystem. The primary feature of the BDCP was a plan to build two 40foot diameter tunnels under the delta, with three intakes, to transfer as much as 9,000 cubic feet per second of Sacramento River water around the delta to the existing pumping plants in the south delta (the initial plan was to have three tunnels). It also contained a provision to build and improve habitat for fish and other wildlife in an attempt to mitigate the environmental damage caused by the tunnels.

The BDCP was abandoned last March when Governor Brown acknowledged that federal agencies were unlikely to grant a 50-year permit to operate the tunnels because the project could not prove it would restore salmon, smelt, sturgeon, and other wildlife struggling for survival in the Delta. Governor Brown's response was to split the BDCP into two parts, California Water Fix and California Eco Restore. The California Water Fix is the twin tunnels project. The "benefit" of this move is that the project would not require a 50-year federal permit. But it exposes the project for what it has been all along - a pure water grab that is likely to destroy the delta, not save it. The project would also not achieve the dual goals described above. A shorter term permit (with likely provisions for year-to-year changes would not improve water reliability. The proposed California Eco Restore would be funded at a much lower level, putting in jeopardy the goal of protecting and enhancing the Delta.

# Please take action now to comment on the tunnels project.

**Putah Creek Fish Kill** Steve Karr reports that the Solano County Water Authority/Solano Irrigation District have flows in the Interdam Reach (between Monticello Dam and the Solano Lake Dam) to facilitate cleaning South Putah Canal. One of the Putah Creek Trout group found dead and stranded small fish in a side channel dewatered by the low flows. If you are on the creek fishing please look at the smaller side channels and count any dead fish and take pictures if possible. Send an email to Steve (sk60@putahcreektrout.org) with counts, pics, and location. Thank you for your help.

**Biased poll on the tunnels** In case you need any more incentive to send in your comments (see above), an advocacy group for the twin tunnels, Californians for Water Security, released the results of a poll that allegedly shows strong support for the tunnel project. In a survey of 1500 voters, they reported that 55% supported the project. After hearing an "explanatory statement" support increased to 79%, and after hearing a statement of "pros and cons" support remained high at 68%. Here are the statements:

**EXPLANATORY STATEMENT:** "The California Water Fix is the plan to fix the state's main water distribution system in part by building two new underground tunnels to replace the infrastructure that currently delivers water from the Sierra Nevada Mountains through the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, to homes, farms and businesses throughout the state."

**CON**: "This project will cost tens of billions of dollars and cost Southern California water customers hundreds of dollars per year, without guaranteeing that it will provide one additional drop of water. Southern California needs to decrease our dependence on outside water sources by investing in increasing local water supplies through desalination, more storage, storm water capture and other local water projects."

**PRO**: "We all agree that Southern California needs to increase local water supplies, but that alone will not ensure water security for our region. We must act now to fix the aging water distribution system that delivers nearly one-third of our local water. If we fail to act, a key portion of our local water supply is at risk in an earthquake. Local water agencies estimate that this plan will only cost the average residential customer five dollars per month, and the cost of inaction to our region is much greater."

As you can see the "explanatory statement" and the "pro and con arguments" are carefully crafted to guide the respondent to the desired conclusion. They make no reference to the environmental damage that will be caused by the tunnel project, no mention of the damage to farms in the delta, only a cursory mention of the costs of the project (and no mention of the lost opportunity to put the funds to a real beneficial use), and no mention of the primary beneficiaries of the project – large agricultural operations in the San Joaquin Valley. What this poll truly highlights is that the Californians polled for this survey know little to nothing about this proposed project.

**Ich outbreak averted** Last month I reported that water was released from Trinity Lake to create a pulse of cold water into the Klamath. Salmon were on the verge of a massive fish kill due to an outbreak of Ich, as happened in 2002. The Bureau of Reclamation was immediately sued by the San Luis & Delta-Mendota Water Authority and Westlands Water District. Their lawsuit was denied, and the good news is that the outbreak was averted and the salmon run is healthy.

**El Niño builds** The odds of a wet winter have become more certain now that the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has announced the probabilities of higher than normal rain throughout California. Southern California is still expected to get the wettest winter, but northern California is looking better. It probably won't make up for four years of drought, but perhaps give some relief and start to fill the reservoirs again.

## Odds of a wet winter

El Niño is expected to bring normal to above-normal rainfall to California between January and March, according to the NOAA.





#### Book of the Month By Jim Luschwitz

#### "The Tug is the Drug" By Chris Santella

For people who like to read on a tablet, try this book.

These thirty pieces take readers from leaping makos near the fairways of Torrey Pines, to midnight Atlantic salmon fishing on the fabled Ponoi, to encounters with very friendly *mujeres* on the streets of Havana... and even offer an unauthorized (yet unequivocal) account of Bob Dylan's 1970s obsession with fishing.



Chris Santella is one of the the most welltraveled writers in the history of the sport of fly fishing. His Travelling lifestyle and eye for entertaining details—even those that have little to do with the act of throwing flies at fish—hold the attention and make us look at fishing in a whole different way.

The people and places that Chris writes aboutfishing's notable characters, oddballs and outcast experts, and places that inspire and sometimes intimidate the average angler define a horizon that most fly fishers will never reach, but Santella brings it all into the foreground.

Chris Santella has more than 600,000 hard cover books in print. His two "Fifty Places" fly fishing books are being adapted for television by the World Fishing Network as

Fifty Places to Fly Fish Before You Die, which will premiere in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter 2015.
