
Hello Fly Fishers of Davis,



CONSERVATION REPORT By Lowell Ashbaugh

Disappearing Kelp Beds If you go diving off the coast of Northern California you would normally enter a dense kelp forest. Recently, though, surveys are showing a barren seascape -93% of the kelp has disappeared in just the last few years. This is a dramatic change in the ecosystem that is invisible to most of us but will certainly affect us all. The figure shows the comparison of kelp cover at four abalone fishery sites in 2008 (left) and 2014 (right).



So why is this important? Abalone and sea urchins are both herbivores that depend on healthy kelp forest ecosystems for food and habitat. But other invertebrates and fish species, such as rockfish, also depend on the shrinking kelp forest ecosystem for food and protection from predation. As the kelp forests have disappeared, abalone and sea urchins are abandoning rock crevices where they normally seek shelter in search of food.

So why is this happening? A series of events took place, started by a toxic algae bloom off the Sonoma County coast in 2011. The toxin released by the algae killed large numbers of marine invertebrates, prompting a closure of the abalone fishery in Sonoma County. Abalone limits have been reduced since 2014, when the fishery was reopened. The toxic algae bloom was followed by a Sea Star Wasting Disease in 2013 that killed large numbers of sea stars from Mexico to Alaska. Sea stars are predators of invertebrates that live in kelp forests. Their loss contributed to an explosion in the purple sea urchin population. These animals consume huge amounts of kelp, and their population ballooned to 60 times their historic density with the loss of sea stars. They created large expanses of what's known as "urchin barrens" that have little, if any, kelp.


The dense kelp forests normally create shade and provide cover for fish species. Without it, many species that are normally protected are more vulnerable to predation. The only thing remaining in the urchin barren is a hard pink algae that can withstand the urchins.

To make matters worse, in 2014 and 2015 water temperatures on the West Coast rose due to the "Warm Blob" in 2014 and the El Niño event that began in 2015. Kelp is very sensitive to changes in water temperature. Kelp is an annual species and must reproduce every year to maintain its population. It may be unable to recover at this point, as the intense grazing by urchins of kelp spores and young plants may prevent them from re-establishing.

The coastal fisheries are already feeling the impacts of this environmental disaster. The commercial red abalone fishery, valued at \$44 million, and red urchin fishery, valued at \$3 million, have collapsed. Abalone, when they are found, are poor quality because the foot (the meaty part) is small and shrunken.

There is little to do about this problem other than to hope Mother Nature helps it recover. But there are a few things:



Election impact on conservation efforts It's not yet clear how the election will affect conservation efforts in California, but it's certain that it will make them more difficult. Donald Trump visited the San Joaquin Valley during the campaign and denied that a drought exists. He also lamented that the water that farmers should have received was flushed out to sea in an effort to protect "a certain kind of 3-inch fish," a reference to the imperiled Delta smelt. He also said "Believe me, we're going to start opening up the water so that you can have your farmers survive." It's clear that he knows nothing about the issue except that he could garner votes, but it's also clear that efforts to protect the delta and the fish species that depend on it, including endangered salmon and Delta smelt, will be harder. The Department of Interior, which oversees federal water and wildlife management in the Delta, will likely be headed by someone who holds little regard for the Endangered Species Act. Efforts to build more water storage reservoirs will be increased, along with efforts to remove or limit Wild and Scenic River

status on the streams we love to fish. Efforts to restore salmon runs on the San Joaquin River, which rely on restoring the river itself, will be made more difficult. The federal government is currently funding that restoration,



but San Joaquin Valley agricultural interests with ties to Trump oppose it. There will certainly be more, but this is a brief list. One bright spot is that California voters consistently prize environmental conditions and work to enhance them. There is much that state officials and citizens can do to protect our environment, despite the pressures by the federal government to damage it. Watch this space for actions you can take.

KQED News did a good analysis of Trump's effect on California's conservation efforts. You can read about it <u>here</u>.

<u>Trinity River Spawning Survey</u> The latest salmon spawning survey shows activity on par with last year – at the lowest end of the range over the last 14 years. There's no indication of the reasons for the poor spawning, but drought and water diversions certainly are factors. Salmon remain endangered throughout California.


