
2017 CALL FOR DUES!



TREASURER'S REPORT 2017

The club financial operations for 2017 are shown in the accompanying pie charts. The Board has budgeted conservatively over the last several years and the checking account balance has grown as a result. The Board decided early in the year to reduce the account balance by increasing support of worthy conservation, and education causes. This year due to a new incoming Treasurer and some accounting changes we have a bit of a surplus for the year at the moment, therefore the checking account balance currently stands at \$30,997. Once again the Club's primary income was from the annual dinner, which accounted for 65% of the funds received – Thank you ALL for supporting our main fundraiser of the year and for the volunteers that make it happen! Membership dues are next, followed by Other which includes various Club Meeting raffles, and Outings . The largest expense item of the year is also the Annual Dinner. Education/outreach and Conservation accounts for 39% of expenditures, followed by Miscellaneous Expenses and Services, Speaker Fees and the other items listed. CONSERVATION REPORT

The Bureau of Reclamation has announced it will conduct an environmental analysis of potential modifications to the operation of the Central Valley Project, in coordination with California's State Water Project, to maximize water deliveries and optimize marketable power generation.

The CVP is a major water source for agricultural, municipal and industrial, and fish and wildlife demands in California. State and federal regulatory actions and other agreements have significantly reduced the water available for delivery south of the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta. This project will evaluate alternatives to restore water supply in consideration of all of the authorized purposes of the CVP.

A Notice of Intent to prepare an environmental impact statement in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act, "Revisions to the Coordinated Long-term Operation of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project, and Related Facilities" was published in the Federal Register, Friday, Dec. 29, 2017 and can be accessed at

https://www.federalregister.gov/documents/current#reclamation-bureau. Reclamation is the lead federal agency and will request other agencies to participate as cooperating agencies. Reclamation is seeking comments by Feb. 1, 2018, that will be used to develop alternatives to the proposed action. Public scoping meetings will be scheduled for mid-January.

Allegations of misbehavior on the Twin Tunnels On January 17 the California State Water Board announced that it would take two weeks to investigate allegations of illegal meetings and unlawful ex parte communications between the Department of Water Resources (DWR) and the State Board's CA WaterFix (Delta Tunnels) hearing team, thereby postponing the first tunnels hearing of 2018 to February 2.

Protestants San Joaquin County, Sacramento County, City of Stockton, City of Antioch, and Local Agencies of the North Delta jointly prepared and filed a motion asking the State Water Board to stay the WaterFix Hearing for 90 days, requesting they review ex parte communications between DWR and the State Board's WaterFix hearing team on Tuesday January 16, 2018.

Ex parte communications in this context are communications between members of the Hearing Team and advocates for one side, without the knowledge of the other side. An analogy would be a substantive discussion between a judge and plaintiff's counsel in a civil lawsuit concerning the lawsuit itself, without the defendants and their counsel ever being informed that such a discussion took place. The unlawful ex parte communications in this case are substantive and concern issues at the heart of the ongoing evidentiary proceeding. These ex parte communications violate Constitutional due process requirements, California law, rules of the Board itself, and other ethical guidelines that apply in such proceedings.

These ex parte communications irrevocably taint the WaterFix Hearing. The requested stay is necessary to allow further investigation into the extent of the ex parte communications and to determine how best to address the ethical misconduct that has occurred.

As background, the most critical approval needed for Governor Brown's twin Delta tunnel legacy project is that of the State Water Resources Control Board. The approval process was initiated by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) and U.S. Bureau of Reclamation in August 2015, by their filing of a Petition for Change. The State Board's approval of that Petition is essential for construction of the proposed project. The WaterFix Hearing is an evidentiary hearing. Twin tunnel proponents and those opposing the twin tunnels, called "protestants," present testimony and other evidence to support their positions before the State Board. The State Board's WaterFix Hearing Officers are the decision-makers who must hear the evidence from all sides and eventually decide the fate of the Petition for Change. They sit as the judges in the WaterFix Hearing. They and the other State Board personnel assisting them in this matter comprise the WaterFix Hearing Team.

<u>California State Parks</u> recently announced the completion of the removal of the Benbow Dam, which is the second largest concrete structure to be removed in California

The removal of the dam, built in 1931 on the Eel River, will help the migration of salmon and restore the habitat for other species.

"The removal of Benbow Dam moves us closer to reversing the alarming decline of West Coast fall-run Chinook, Coho salmon and summer-run steelhead by restoring access to an additional 96 miles of prime habitat along the Eel River," said Pat Montanio, director of the office of habitat conservation in NOAA Fisheries.

"This project benefits surrounding communities by removing a public safety hazard for boaters and park visitors."

The Benbow Dam removal project began in 2010 with planning and engineering and a grant from American Rivers. State Parks later received a grant from NOAA Restoration Center to begin work following a multiagency environmental review.

The demolition work began in 2016. Earlier than expected, high flows that year from winter storms and the

potential to affect salmonid migration halted the project in mid-October 2016. Work began again in August 2017 and was completed in October.

"The removal of Benbow Dam has significant positive impacts for riparian natural resources and added safety for recreational users of the Eel River, while eliminating costly repairs and maintenance," said Victor Bjelajac, superintendent of the California State Parks North Coast Redwoods district.

"Many thanks to staff and management from the California Department of Parks and Recreation, participating agencies and the public for making the project a success."

Future phases of the project are planned to help restore and rehabilitate riverine habitat.

Planting will take place over the winter with additional monitoring of the vegetation and river response to follow over the next few years.

FFD OUTINGS: WINTER TRINITY RIVER

On the week leading up to FFD's annual winter steelhead outing, the Trinity County area enjoyed a much needed shot of rain. Optimism ran high as the river turned slightly off color and CFS levels were on the rise. Fresh fish entering the system were reported by many. The group of anxious participants consisted of Beverly Beckman and Mike McDonald; Kris Kordona and his son, Kyle; Rich Sakai; John Taylor, Roger Hull; and myself.

On day one, the upper runs (Rush Creek to Steele Bridge) produced for Bev and Mike who were fishing the Trinity for the first time. While the wild adult eluded them, both hooked and landed a handful of feisty half-pounders. The second boat of John Taylor and Roger Hull covered much of the same water and also experienced positive results. However, on that day, the hot rod of the boat (for that fact, the trip) was held by Roger. While John was tested by a few half-pounders, Roger hooked and landed two (2) adult steelies, one of which was a wild chrome bullet. Both fish were estimated to be in the five (5) pound class.

Rich and I fished Lorenzo Gulch to Sky Ranch run on the middle stretch of the system. Rich enjoyed some success landing a half-pounder and hooking, though not landing, a spirited adult. On the other hand, I enjoyed a very relaxing scenic float with no disturbances the entire day. Saturday night our group gathered for dinner at the ever popular Weaverville Country Club. While rumors that Judge Elihu Smails was in the rooms, he was nowhere to be found. Food and service were good but the company was great.

Day two was, to say the least, a challenge. The positive effects of the week's earlier rain had long since disappeared. Flows were now in the mid 300's with gin clear water clarity. Despite the success experienced on the upper river, a decision was made to explore the "canyon" run of Sky Ranch to Pidgeon Point. The float was scenically beautiful but produced little with the exception of Rich's hook-up at the take out. Unfortunately, it was not brought to the boat.

Certainly not the most productive trip from a "fish" perspective but otherwise it was great trip.

FFD OUTREACH: SALMON IN THE CLASSROOM






