*T*his month, Tuesday July 31st, the Fly Fishers of Davis will hear from James Sampsel of Humble Heron Fly Fishing. This is the Rogue's "Best of the Best". In this presentation James will break down the Rogue River into 3 dominant sections the Upper, Middle, & Lower Rogue. He will outline the personality and feel of each section seasonally in pursuit of steelhead on the swung fly. Steelhead live in beautiful places. The art and pursuit of steelhead on the swung fly lends to storybook settings that inspire us long after we leave the river. The paintings James creates are the impressions left behind by fond river memories with guests, family, & friends.



Humble Heron Fly Fishing is a fly fishing outfit out of Grants Pass Oregon. Owners James and Kait (Bailey) Sampsel started their operations the Fall of 2016 but have guided rivers all over the west and Central America collectively for the better part of 24 years. Their focus is on the zen of the swung fly to illusive steelhead. They passionately guide guests on many of Southern Oregon's premier rivers and consider the Rogue River their bread and butter.

CONSERVATION REPORT

The Valadao Rider that would prevent lawsuits on the Twin Tunnels was vetted by two large water districts. Restore the Delta's recent Public Records Act request for documents from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) reveal that Kern County Water Agency (KCWA) and MWD consulted Ken Calvert's Legislative Aide, Ian Foley, on the language of the Valadao Rider—a supplemental provision to the House Appropriations spending bill that would exempt the Central Valley Project and State Water Project from judicial review. The Valadao rider was added to the Appropriations bill after the Calvert rider was approved by the Interior subcommittee.

These findings supplement Restore the Delta's findings from the same PRA request released last week.

On May 21, 2018, Ian Foley emailed MWD Assistant General Manager Roger Patterson and KCWA Assistant General Manager Brent Walthall to "quietly share" some language from the House Appropriations spending bill and asked both Assistant General Managers for their thoughts. The shared language reads:

"None of the funds made available by this Act or any other Act of Congress shall be used by the Department of the Interior to modify or otherwise adjust the Reasonable and Prudent Alternative described in the Fish and Wildlife Service's December 15, 2008, biological opinion on the coordinated operations of the Central Valley Project and the State Water Project or the Department of Commerce to modify or otherwise adjust the Reasonable and Prudent Alternative described in the National Marine Fisheries Service's June 4, 2009, Biological Opinion and Conference Opinion on the Long-Term Operations of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project in any manner that would further contain or limit the ability of the Central Valley Project or California State Water Project to provide, at the earliest possible date, the maximum quantity of water supplies to Central Valley Project agricultural, municipal, and industrial contractors, water service or repayment contractors, water rights settlement contracts, exchange contractors, refuge contractors, and State Water Project Contractors".

Mr. Waltall (KCWA) responded that he thinks Kern County would support the language but anticipated that the Valadao rider would create more backlash from tunnels opponents.

Executive Director of Restore the Delta, Barbara Barrigan-Parrilla said, "The collective effort made by

Representative Valadao, Congressman Calvert and his staff, Metropolitan, and Kern County Water Agency to strip due process rights from all residents, municipalities, water districts etc. who live in the Sacramento and San Joaquin River watersheds and the Delta is Un-American and Anti-Californian."

It's clear that the Tunnel proponents and the water districts do not care at all about the environment or our fisheries, but only about maximizing water exports to corporate farms and southern California urban areas.

In related news, the MWD voted once again to fund the two-tunnel alternative after concerns were raised about possible violations of the Brown Act following the initial vote. To ensure the vote was legal, the board voted again to support two tunnels. A number of tunnels opponents spoke out following the revote.k

"This re-vote is a perfect example of why ratepayers must demand that the tunnels project should not go forward," said Sacramento County Supervisor Don Nottoli. "A powerful few water giants ignored Brown Act rules meant to protect ratepayers, got caught, and only then conceded to comply with state law.

It's an unnecessarily costly, destructive project pushed by people who are trying to fix the system against anyone who opposes them. Their narrow public interest will significantly increase utility bills for California ratepayers and irreparably harm the Delta."

And in some good news, the State Water Resources Control Board has proposed a new policy on Delta Flows that would keep more water in the rivers for fish. The board said more water is necessary to prevent environmental disaster. Several major species of fish are on the brink of extinction, and increasing river flows will help them survive.

"We've simply taken too much water out of the system for the natural ecosystem to survive," said board Chairwoman Felicia Marcus in a conference call with reporters. She said the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, the hub of the state's elaborate water-delivery network, "is on the verge of collapse."

This is some of the best news I've heard in years, but it's sure to provoke lawsuits from those who want all the water for other purposes.

Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke came to California recently to tour both Don Pedro Reservoir and New Melones Reservoir just weeks after the State Water Resources

Control Board released its final draft of the Bay-Delta Water Quality Control Plan update, which calls for allocation of 40 percent of unimpaired flows along the lower San Joaquin River and its tributaries — the Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Merced rivers — to help rehabilitate the area's native fish species. ...”

The visit raised hopes among area farmers that the federal government would step in to stop the Water Board's proposal.

In a statement that shows how little he knows of California water issues, Zinke said “I do believe part of the solution in California is more storage.” In contrast to regional battles in the West over Colorado River water, Zinke said, water is plentiful in the Sierra watersheds for meeting needs. Apparently, he has not heard of climate change and how it may affect our water supplies.

A \$1.6 Billion Dollar loan request from the newly formed Delta Conveyance Finance Authority (DCFA) for federal government financing has drawn the attention of Twin Tunnels opponents. Despite the policy of having the beneficiaries of water projects pay for them, the loan would put millions of Californians on the hook to repay it through higher water bills.

The Delta Counties Coalition (DCC) responded to the loan request from the Trump Administration through an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) program for construction of “WaterFix”:

“The Metropolitan Water District and other tunnel proponents that make up the DCFA, haven't even started the project and they are already seeking a federal deal,” said Sacramento County Supervisor and DCC Chair Don Nottoli.

The U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI), the lead federal agency responsible for the environmental review of California WaterFix, is on record signaling that it does not expect to participate in the funding or construction of the tunnels. In October of last year, Russell Newell, a spokesman for DOI, said: “While the Department of the Interior shares the goals of the state of California to deliver water with more certainty, eliminating risks to the California water supply, and improving the environment, at this time, the Department under the current state proposal does not expect to participate in the construction or funding of the CA WaterFix.”

“WaterFix has always been a water grab and, to top it off, they want taxpayers to underwrite a mega low-interest loan that will irreparably harm the Delta” continued Nottoli. “We hope EPA, like DOI, will oppose providing funding or financing for the project.”

If the JPA gains access to \$1.6 billion in financing, it will crowd out funding that could otherwise be used by other California agencies throughout the State. This essentially slams the door on critical projects that, unlike WaterFix, could actually increase the State's water supply for many California communities.

The DCC is an alliance of the counties of Contra Costa, Sacramento, San Joaquin, Solano and Yolo. The DCC advocates for protecting the interests of the Delta and California's water supply and has produced a set of approaches that will achieve balance for the economic and environmental health of the Delta while also improving water supply stability.

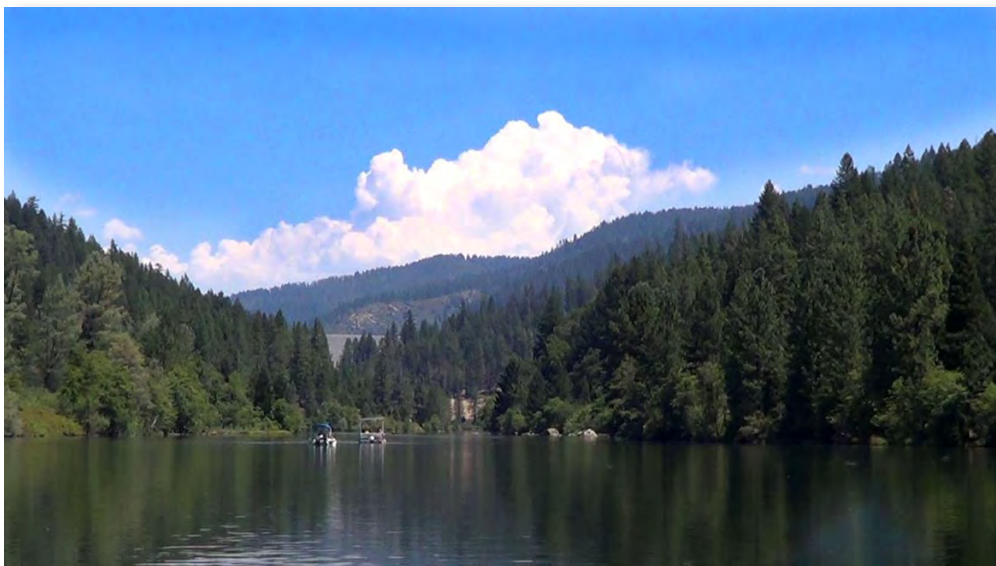
Lewiston was one of, or the first, Club trip and for many years extremely popular. Then about 10 years ago the happy times at Poison Oak Hollow slowly soured, and attendance deteriorated almost to 0. 3-4 years ago the campground was changed to Old Lewiston Bridge RV Park, and whether because of that change or the good fishing in Lewiston Lake the number of members on the trip began to increase each year. This year was like the outings 20 years ago with 15 members there at one time or other. These included various recidivists including Paul Berliner, Dave Yarborough, Jack Norlyn, Donn and Ronnie Erickson, Dan Mini, Bob Brodberg (after a long absence), Jim and Miyoko Wright and the original and current fishmeisters, Steve Ohrwall and Cary Boyden. More important from the Club perspective were the first time attendees Mike Rivers, Dave and Roberta Burke and Jim's son Wayne,

The trip began Thursday the 12th in the usual ungodly heat of the typical Lewiston summer. It was for the majority kind of a warmup with Paul landing an 18 incher and various other fish, Mike Rivers in what turned out to be his best session landing 5 in an hour on streamers and the rest of that day's fishermen catching the numbers which might be expected in the shorter session. However, Jim, Miyoko and Wayne fishing in the tailrace of the hatchery truck landed in the neighborhood of 25 somewhat confused/shocked freshly stocked rainbows.

Friday mercifully dawned cloudy with even a few most welcome raindrops. The fishing was similar to the prior day taking into consideration the longer period with several fish in the range of 19" landed. Everyone caught something, although Dave Burke's was actually an sdr, a fate conquered Saturday. While Mike had done well with streamers on Thursday by the end of the day in desperation he went to the indicator setup the rest were using with greater success. Clearly the most successful fly following recent experience was a #18 Tiger Midge (sort of sounds like Dana's report on Baum where the fly has also been the go to pattern of late).

Saturday was more of the same with Dave Yarborough schooling the fishmeister with 19 to the net. Again the fish, while not in the numbers of a few years back, were significantly larger on average than usual. In total there are 2 19" fish, at least 2 18" and numerous around 17. Fish wise if the idea is everyone catch something this trip made the grade!

But more important the group really melded beautifully. Meals were full of active back and forth making it tough for the harder of hearing to figure out much of what was being said (in this context a plus). The post meal sessions in the tent area watching the deer were lively, and Saturday night's usual out to dinner was enjoyed by all. And for once this meister is not inclined to dwell on the menus although certainly no complaints were apparent. Basically an altogether great outing!

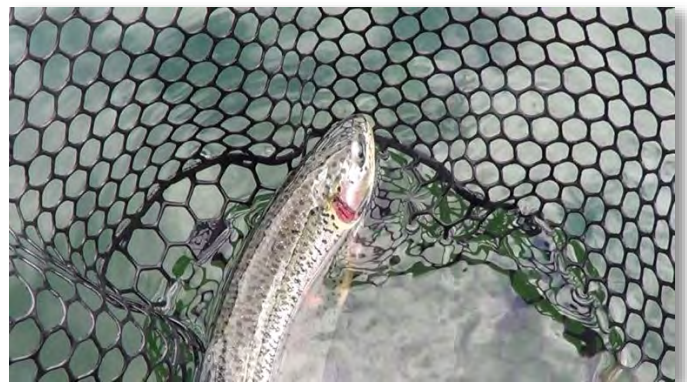

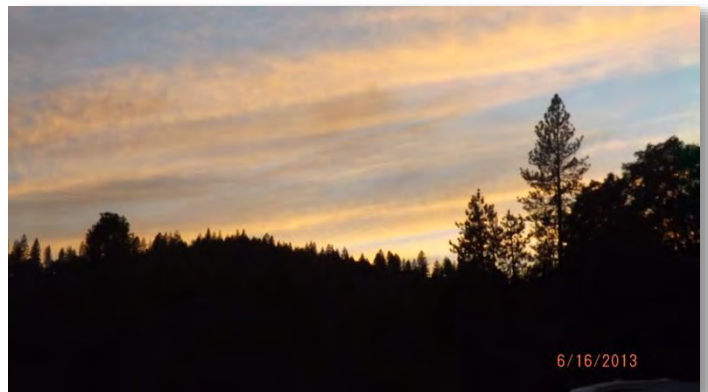

FFD TRAVELS: Fuller Lake

What I learned yesterday at Lake Fuller; I just had to share:

Members Jon Mangum and Donn Erickson made the drive (1.45 hrs from Davis) to Fuller Lake in the Sierras on July 25. The lake was stocked last week, probably for the last time this year. Conventional wisdom has it that one should try and get up there within a couple weeks of stocking. Looking at the schedule from DFW, the lake was stocked 3 times this year in Apr, Jun and Jul.

We brought our float tubes and were in the water about 10 am. Did not get a nibble. Saw a guy fly fishing and catching and we talked. He said you can strip leeches early in the season, but not effective in July.

He said he always uses the same technique: indicator. BB shot about 5 ft from the bottom fly. Bottom fly is black silver bead head zebra about sz 18. Above that about 15 inches is a sz 14 green calabaetis. He anchors. Tosses the rig upstream or at an angle upstream, to about perpendicular to the shore line. He waits a couple seconds for the rig to settle and then starts stripping it back. Generally two 2-inch quick jerks over about a second, then a one second pause, interspersed with some 4 inch medium speed strips all the way back to the boat. Then he slowly lifts the rig out of the water to cast again, not infrequently getting a fish as he does that. Says that it isn't a problem if the bottom fly is at the same depth as the bottom as he is always moving the rig.

Jon and I rigged up like our friend and imitated his retrieve and soon we were getting fish as well—Jon 10 to hand and me 6 from about 11:30 to 4:30 (with a break for lunch). Even one double with several LDRs and other takes. Zebra got about 2/3 of the fish. Calabaetis on the upper fly got the others.

Our friend says the best fishing is about 9 -1. He got nothing earlier in the AM. Says there is an afternoon doldrums, but Jon and I did not find that.

Other notes: The senior pass does not work there. \$7 day pass, or \$10 for boat launch.

Our friend say that Rancho Seco is a great winter fishery from Dec to early March. He uses the same technique for trout, crappie and an occl bass.

We noted some surface activity mid to late afternoon. Also some activity in the shallows. Next time I might try stripping with an intermediate or floating line and a long leader for these.
