Yolo Fair Youth Drawing Wrap-UP



FLY PATTERN OF THE MONTH Elk Hair Caddis

The Elk Hair Caddis originated with Al Troth and is a very popular and effective caddis imitation. It floats well and can be easily seen on the water. The fly may be tied in a variety of sizes and colors to match the local caddis adults. In the fall on Oregon's Deschutes river, a size 20 or 22 pale yellow version with bleached elk hair wing is very effective on the back eddies and flat water. Tying the elk hair caddis will expose you to hair stacking for the wing, dubbing a body and tying in a hair that has some flare.

ELK HAIR CADDIS

Hook: Dry fly hook either TDE or Ring eyed. **Body:** Dubbed in color to match the local caddis.

Rib: Fine gold or silver wire counter wrapped over the

hackle


Hackle: Palmered in color to match the body

Wing: Stacked elk hair

Head: Butts of the wing trimmed close to give a stub


Tying Instructions: Attach the thread in the usual manner and dress the shank bringing the thread to the barb position. Tie in about six inches of fine gold wire and dub a body from the back position leaving about 1/16 "by the eye. Taper a fairly heavy body making it larger at the front. At the head position, tie in a prepared hackle feather by its stem with the shinny side facing forward. Wrap the stem leaving about 1/8" between the start of the thread wraps and the eye. Palmer the hackle backward through the body and tie it off with the gold wire by wrapping the wire over the last turn of the hackle. Take two more turns around the hackle at the bend and spiral the wire forward between the hackle. Tie the wire off at the eye position. Select a small bunch of elk hair and remove the fine under-hair with a comb or your fingers. Even the ends by stacking in a hair stacker or with your fingers. Tie the hair on top of the hook shank with a loose loop and pinch technique taking a second wrap and then tighten. The tips extending backwards should be about 1/8 to 3/16 " longer than the bend of the hook. The elk hair butts facing forward can either be trimmed and the fly finished by whip finishing in the collar area formed by tying down the elk hair, or the butts can be lifted up and the whip finish can be applied to the eye as usual. It may be easier to trim the butts of the elk hair to length before tying in the wing.

There are advantages and disadvantages to the various



ways of tying in the wing and finishing the head. Experiment. An alternative method to tying the fly is to tie in the tip of the hackle at

the barb position and palmer it in the normal fashion. With this technique it's harder to get the hackle to project toward the rear. Some tiers trim the hackle on the back and the bottom or just the bottom to let the fly ride in the surface film
