Prez Says from Bill Rains



I suggested tying a rope to the cooler and the other end to John R's truck but the opinion of those involved was that two men were more likely to pull it up the hill than John,s truck. Fortunately the two other (young) Johns showed up and with their youth coupled with my stupidity and John R supervising the four of us pulled it up the hill. My back still has not forgiven me. It is very apparent that the increased pressure on Putah Creek will require even more attention to maintaining it both as a fishery and a pleasant experience. Our effort will be more critical in the future. I was greatly pleased when two flyfishers stopped me and asked what were we doing. I explained the activity and he indicated that he would encourage his Club to do a similar activity. We can only hope that other groups will volunteer their effort and more importantly the general public will use the area in a more responsible way.

From the Conservation Desk of Lowell Ashbaugh......

Our annual Putah Creek cleanup was a success! After being rained out on December 1, nearly a dozen club members joined two dedicated volunteers from Novato and Tracy on December 15 and cleaned up tons of trash from the creek bed. Ironically, there were very few anglers out that day. They probably knew we were coming and didn't want to be embarrassed fishing while we picked up around them. Haul highlights included a swamp cooler and water heater, a TV, four tires, a rear axle with drum brakes attached, bed frame, and enough waterproof wallboard to do a small bathroom. Along with the usual number of pampers, of course - yuck! Weinermeister Tom Burton outdid himself with lunch, and we all had our fill. And our new friend from Novato recently sent in his membership fee. Thanks, Mike Colberg!

Last fall I applied to PG&E National Energy Group for a \$5,000 grant to enlarge our Salmon in the Classroom project from the current 15 classrooms to 35-40. It would have served about 700 students when fully implemented. Unfortunately, we were not selected to receive an award. Oddly, a group in Oregon received \$5,000 to reach about 50 students with the same program. I'll keep looking for more funds.

The Klamath Basin is starting to heat up again. The farmers agitating for more irrigation water decided to cool it after September 11, but now the rain has returned and they want to reinstate

irrigation. Unfortunately, most everyone there is highly polarized, and most are working on emotion. The polarization has led to increased racism toward the tribal people, including shooting threats. President Bush recently got into the act, and is supporting the farmers. The Pacific Legal Foundation is planning to file suit to overturn the National Marine Fisheries Service listing of the coho salmon as a threatened species, saying it's based on "junk science." They have support from an earlier court ruling that hatchery fish and wild fish are no different.

Earlier this month, farming supporters held a rally that featured barbequed coho salmon from the hatchery. It looks like it may be a rough year ahead. Westlands Water District in the San Joaquin Valley is pursuing land retirement as a solution to their problems. The land now must be heavily irrigated to avoid salt buildup. The salt-laden water then has to go somewhere, and it now goes into drainage ponds to evaporate. Kesterson was one such drainage pond. And much of the water that goes to Westlands currently comes from the Trinity River (you were probably wondering why this matters to you, eh?).

Westlands has been seeking guarantees of water, including through the Calfed process. After much lobbying, Senator Feinstein's CalFed reauthorization legislation was successfully amended (by Barbara Boxer) to remove several onerous provisions, including a 70% guarantee of water supplies to Westlands.

Other provisions included preauthorization of water storage projects in the Central Valley, including the raising of Shasta Dam, that have not been evaluated economically or environmentally.

Pattern of the Month Brindel Bug



The brindle bug is a popular Klamath and Trinity steelhead pattern that is effective and simple to tie. Lloyd Silvius from Eureka CA introduced the pattern around

1960. In smaller sizes, the Brindel Bug is a reasonable stonefly imitation for resident trout.

Pattern:

Thread: Black 6/0

Hook: 2x stout, 2x long down eye, size 2 to 10.

Tail: Two natural brown hackle tips

Body: Variegated black and yellow chenille

Rib: Oval gold tinsel (optional) Hackle: natural brown collar

Tying instructions:

- Bend down the bark and place the hook securely in your vice. Attach the tying thread at the tail position and tie in two natural brown hackle tips just above the barb position. The hackle tip should be about ½ to 2/3 the shank length and the dull sides should be facing inward.
- Cut a 3-4 inch length (depends on chenille and hook size) of variegated chenille and strip about 1/4 inch of the pile from the thread core. Tie the chenille to the hook shank with the tag end of thread core. Wrap the core to the point where the pile (or fibers) on the chenille begins. This makes for less bulk when the chenille is attached. Wrap the chenille to form a body. Lift the hackle tips and take the first wrap behind the hackle tips so that they are cocked upward at about 30 to 45°. When you reach a point about 1/8 inch behind the eye, take two wraps over the chenille to secure it and cut the remaining material leaving about ¼ inch on the free end. Again, strip the pile from the thread core. Hold the thread core and wrap the chenille down with additional wraps. Be sure to eave sufficient space for the thread head

- and the hackle.
- Attach a natural brown hackle and take about 4 wraps (vary the number of turns to suit your preference for a sparse or fuller fly). Tie off the hackle and make a neat thread head. Whip finish and cement. Apply a second coat of head cement when the first coat has dried. Steelhead flies take a beating and the second coat of cement is worthwhile.

Some people tie the pattern with oval gold tinsel rib and others do not cant the tail up. The fly can be tied as described or it can be weighted with lead wire to get it down in fast currents.

Gary LaFontaine Loses Battle with Lou Gehrig's Disease

Gary LaFontaine died January 4, 2002 after a lengthy battle with Lou Gehrig's disease, or ALS. He was 56 years old and is survived by his daughter Heather LaFontaine-Ellison and her husband Patrick Ellison.

Gary LaFontaine published more than 100 articles on fly fishing in more than a dozen different national and regional publications. He authored five books and coauthored many more including the just-released books *Fly Fishing the Yellowstone* (with Bob Jacklin) and *Fly Fishing the Madison* (with Craig Mathews). Before he died he was working on a book on Blue-winged Olives.

While Gary is perhaps best known for his classic work *Caddisflies*, and his revolutionary "sparkle pupa" series of fly patterns, his legacy is much more than that. Perhaps Steve Qualline of Bob Marriott's Fly Fishing store has expressed it best, "Gary's greatest legacy was the way he touched, and taught, countless lovers of fly fishing." In the past few days, Steve's sentiment has been echoed many times over by legions of Gary's friends and admirers.
