## **Prez Says .... from John** Forsyth

Winter days are here and fishing opportunities have slowed, so it's time to tie flies. For those of you who don't tie, you may want to give it a try. Resident master, Bob Zasoski will be starting a new round of classes in the next few months.

There are many reasons to tie; though it's not a requirement to be a competent flyfisher. The main reason is it's fun. It's a special thrill to catch a fish on one of your own flies. At first it doesn't seem possible to tie something a fish actually would grab. However, with a little practice you can slowly become proficient in the patterns you use. I remember starting when I was about 15 years old. I didn't fly fish then but instead trolled with the usual assortment of hardware for trout in the lakes of eastern Washington.

One day at our favorite spot, Twin Lakes on the Colville Indian Reservation, we were not having our usual success. Buster, the resort owner suggested we try a small green fly over the weed beds. Bingo! Later we found a black streamer pattern worked great for brook trout tight along the shoreline trolled fast. Little did we know we were using damsel and leach imitations. My dad bought me a very simple tying kit, and I went to work with only a one-page sheet of instructions and youthful exuberance. I didn't have a bobbin, but just a cap on the spool to hold the thread in place. A half hitch knot was my only way to secure things (a whip finisher and head cement was unknown to me). Slowly I began producing streamers with a variety of colors for the body, tail, beard and wing. I didn't like tying just one pattern, constantly experimenting with different combinations (a characteristic I still have today). To my total amazement these flies actually worked, and even if the trout weren't hooked, I was.

Luckily I had the opportunity to learn from a local genius tier and fisherman, John Newbury, who's unique and innovative patterns are featured in several publications. There are a number of fantastic resources to help you along, but individual instruction by a veteran tier is gold. My tying kit, that cost a few dollars and fit in a shoebox, now barely fits in a closet and no doubt cost thousands of dollars. Although many people think it's got to be cheaper to tie your own, don't be fooled. If you can limit your patterns to a dozen or so, it might be cost effective. However, if your like most of us crazy tiers, you'll have to have all the colors of wire or crystal flash for a rib, when plain old copper wire from the hardware store would suffice and last a lifetime (see John Reynolds for Okie tech tips). But, that wouldn't be as fun, and I think Emu feathers really do make a better Callibaetis tail.

So restock you boxes or if you are interested in learning to tie, sign up for Bob's excellent classes and begin your

## From the CONSERVATION DESK By Lowell Ashbaugh

Trinity River action. Judge Oliver Wanger approved a \$139 million settlement of a lawsuit brought by San Joaquin Valley farmers against the federal government. The farmers claim their land was rendered useless by salt buildup because the government did not provide adequate drainage, as promised, of their land. The land was worthless as farmland until the Trinity River was dammed and the water was sent south through a series of tunnels and canals.

The Westlands Water District will pay 105 landowners \$33 million to assume ownership of all but about 1600 acres of the land. It will also assume the water rights. The Bureau of Reclamation will pay \$107 million in damages for the loss of the poisoned land.

There are several aspects of this settlement that are troubling. First is that the Westlands Water District retains the water rights. The water is coming from the Trinity River, which was supposed to get increased flows for fish pursuant to a Record of Decision entered into by the Bureau of Reclamation in the last days of the Clinton administration after 20 years of negotiation. The same federal judge that OK'd this settlement has stalled implementation of the Record of Decision. The fish are paying the price.

Second, the expectation is that the \$107 million payment from the Bureau of Reclamation will be paid by hijacking funds for other water projects in California. Recently, the entire California congressional delegation protested this action, saying that the funds should come from other sources so as not to punish California by denying other worthy water projects.

Finally, more than half the money would go to just four families, including that of former Secretary of State Bill Jones. Whatever happened to the small farm limit of 160 acres to receive federal water?

Judge Wanger did not address the issue of where the funds would come from, saying that he was ruling only on the settlement's fairness. My question is "To Whom?"
