He also worked in Redding for several years and consequently, he is very familiar with our northern California fisheries. Andy developed a number of successful fly patterns and writes the monthly *At the Vise* column for



California Fly Fisher. He also writes for California Fly Fisher and is published in several other fly fishing journals. Andy is a featured tier at regional and national fly fishing shows such as the San Mateo and San Rafael. You can always learn something new from Andy. His presentations are interesting and informative. Andy will be tying flies beginning at 7:00 P.M. He is a master tier. Plan to come early and see Andy tie the flies that catch big fish and then find out how is done later in the evening.

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#### Payne in the Ranch ....

Seven intrepid clubsters showed up for this fall's hike into Payne Ranch. (Bob Beverlin, Tom Burton, Gene Gantt, Rollie Simons, Robert Brodberg, Jack Mills and myself) The weather couldn't have been nicer with mid-day temps in the 70's. Everyone caught fish with top honors going to Jack Mills who made it look disgustingly easy. Your newsletter editor, "the Bobber", again set the standard for wet wading technique. "Spot", the dog, even got into the action. Rollie's claim to have caught a "Pikie Minnow" couldn't be substantiated.





The evening hike out through Thompson and Craig Canyons was serene. Jack Mills led the way and spotted 4 adult elk loitering along Craig Creek. (Which we promptly chased away!)





We capped off the day with some tasty Mexican food and beer at the ever-popular Ibarra's in downtown, metropolitan Guinda, known far and wide for its funky restrooms.

BLM, together with CDF, has embarked on a weed mangement program on the Payne Ranch properties targeting, among other things, Tamerisk, YST, and Medusahead. In early June they burned off some 200 acres. This fall/winter the 75 acre burn at 'Road Kill Cafe' will be seeded with a mix of native grasses. They are prepared to use Transline as necessary to control star thistle as the slow-growing natives establish. For those who hike regularly at Payne Ranch the next 5 years should see an exciting and dramatic change (improvement).

This month the fly pattern is the October Caddis Emerger or Nymph. The large orange caddis is unique to the western United States and provides a tasty morsel for trout in the fall. Adult October Caddis can be 1.5 inches long. These impressive caddis are only found in the Pacific Northwest, particularly in Oregon, Washington, British Columbia, and Northern California. The genera has been reported in Alaska. Any of the popular caddis patterns can be adapted to imitate this insect so long as they are big and orange. Mike Mercer and Ralph Cutter both have versions of the pupae/emerger that are relatively simple to tie. The picture shown similar to the Tangerine Dream designed by Ralph Cutter. According to Ralph's web site the pupae may roam the river bed for days before emerging and therefore is available to the fish for some time during September and October. Interestingly, I see very few fish taking the adults on Oregon's Deschutes River in spite of large hatch this time of the year.

Ralph Cutter's Tangerine Dream.

Note: the hackle in the photo is dyed partridge and is tied long like a soft hackle. Ralph's version and Mercer's Emerger have shorter hackle. A larger version of the Fox poopah we tied last month is another possibility as an October Caddis imitation. A tungsten bead version is called the Fox Pewpah.

### Tying instructions.

Debarb the hook and start the thread near the rear of the fly. Dub a full body of the rabbit antron mix -any mix of long fiber fir with some sparkle will work. Pick out or comb the body to make it shaggy. Tie in and wrap a collar of hen hackle or other soft hackle tie off the feather, make a neat thread head and whip finish. Coat the head with cement. Find a fish and hang on.
