ROD BUILDING CLASS

The rod building class will be held at the Viticulture field building (same place as fly tying) starting Wednesday July 26^{th} and will be every Wed night through August 16^{th} (four class sessions). Class hours are 7:00 - 10:00 PM.

Students should order the rod blank and assembly kit and bring all components with them to the first class. There will be old generation Lamaglass blanks/kits available at the first class for a donation of \$75 to be used towards our "Salmon in the Classroom" program. There are 20 blanks/kits that are from 6 weights to 9 weights and were donated to the club by the late Aaron Zak Zakarian.

Students will need a small package of single edge razor blades or Exacto knife with new replacement blades. A small pair of scissors will be useful as well. You can use your fly tying scissors. If you are right handed let your left thumb nail grow a little and if you are left handed just the opposite applies. I will explain later (don't let me forget).

Payne Ranch Work Day For those of you who have trekked into Payne Ranch, enjoyed the views and stuck some of the feisty little bass there may be an opportunity to do some pond fixin'. One of the ponds west of Road Kill Café (see photo at right- thanks, John Hodgson) is about to be lost as the spillway slowly but surely erodes away. This process appears to have been ongoing for many years. BLM recognizes the problem and has earmarked monies for at least a temporary fix. There is a good chance that some kind of short-term repair effort involving RMEF (Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation) will be undertaken before the rainy season starts this fall. If you brought it in, take it out. Every scrap of it. Don't make new tracks. Use visible roads and paths when possible.

Get the lead out. Use a substitute.

Any angler with a fish on.

Any stationary angler.

Loreto, Baja South, June 25-29

What a wonderful trip and at a third of the price of Alaska! Signed up with American Fly (www.americanflyfishing.com) for a sponsored trip to Loreto at \$725 (room, breakfast, some free drinks, fishing for 3 days). Left Sac on Sunday AM changing to Alaska Air in LA, flying directly into Loreto (flights by Aeromexico and Alaska only, on Su, Tu and Th). Started adjusting to the temp and humidity which both ran about 95-100. A two mile taxi ride and I was at La Pinta, a modest hotel in town, on the beach, with great pool/restaurant. Met by Peter Blackman (beer in hand) and escorted to my room (with a beautiful vista) which I shared with Victor, another hardcore fly fisher. Peter briefed me on rigging and tactics, and then we walked around town, eating at a fantastic little restaurant. Then readied our gear for the big next day.





We were met on the beach at 6 AM by our guides in Pangas with 100hp outboards, two fisherman per boat, some English, then over to the marina where we stocked up on freshly netted sardines (dorado attractants) +/or mackerel (billfish bait). Then to the fish which could be as little as 20 minutes or as much as an hour away. On the way we watched the sunrise and spotted marlin putting on jumping shows, flying fish, turtles, jumping dorado, mantas, porpoises and beautiful, rugged scenery.

We come mainly for dorado (dolphin fish) which are caught trolling, or casting to pods which seem to gravitate to small clumps of sargasso grass floating on the surface—or maybe just to a turtle sunning himself on the surface. Trolling was done with fly rods or with conventional outfits, with special leaders and big flies or a mackerel. When the guide spotted a mat of grass, he would stop, and to see if there were fish around, toss out a few sardines. If there were dorado there, the surface would explode as these rocket ships annihilated the minnows. Then we would start casting with 4" top water poppers or flies/sinking line. The dorado would attack these flies extremely aggressively, sometimes hitting a couple of times before one got hooked and then they'd take off like a bullet, jumping repeatedly with more long runs. Fishing these pods could go on an hour or more, until other boats got wind of the bonanza and joined us, soon scattering the pod. At times the dorado would get fussy, and then a sardine imitation fly or a real sardine was best.





Size of the dorado ranged from about 4 to 40 pounds, though one of our group claimed a 60lber! They are stunningly beautiful and effervesce in the water green/blue/yellow. They all jump, some as many as 8 times—and I do mean jump. Some pods held perhaps hundreds of fish of various sizes streaking around under the boat, nabbing sardines thrown by the guide; other pods were smaller and had more uniform sized fish. A thirty pounder could take about 30 minutes to land. I fished 4 days and killed them 2 days, did fair on 1 and got skunked on 1. My #11 was perfect for dorado but I'd bring a #14 if trying for sails. Conventional gear is best for squid as they are really deep and strong. My #9 was a bit wimpy for dorado. A #7 or #9 would work fine for cabilla, etc. My Ross 6 reel did very well on dorado, but sails/yellowtail would require an upgrade and maybe 500 yds of backing.





Seas were generally fairly calm. Temps were fine when trolling; heated up a bit when stationary. The area develops thunder heads every afternoon with a few showers a couple days per month. June and July are the best months for dorado. Guide quality varied somewhat, as did the reliability of their equipment. No gear was provided but could be rented. Tip for the guide was generally \$30-\$40 and maybe a fish or two for home. Besides dorado, I caught squid, trumpet fish, rock bass, bonita. I hooked a sailfish at an est. 100#; one of our group brought one in and we had a couple other hookups. Also available were cabrilla, snapper and yellow tail. The squid was a wonderful meal one night for us; brought it into a restaurant and asked them to fry it up—done beautifully.

Total cost for 3 days fishing: \$1700 with \$750 for air, \$725 for tour, \$25 for bait, \$50 tips, rest for drinks/meals. It was a fantastic experience and I will do it again next year. Anyone interested? - **Donn Erickson**
