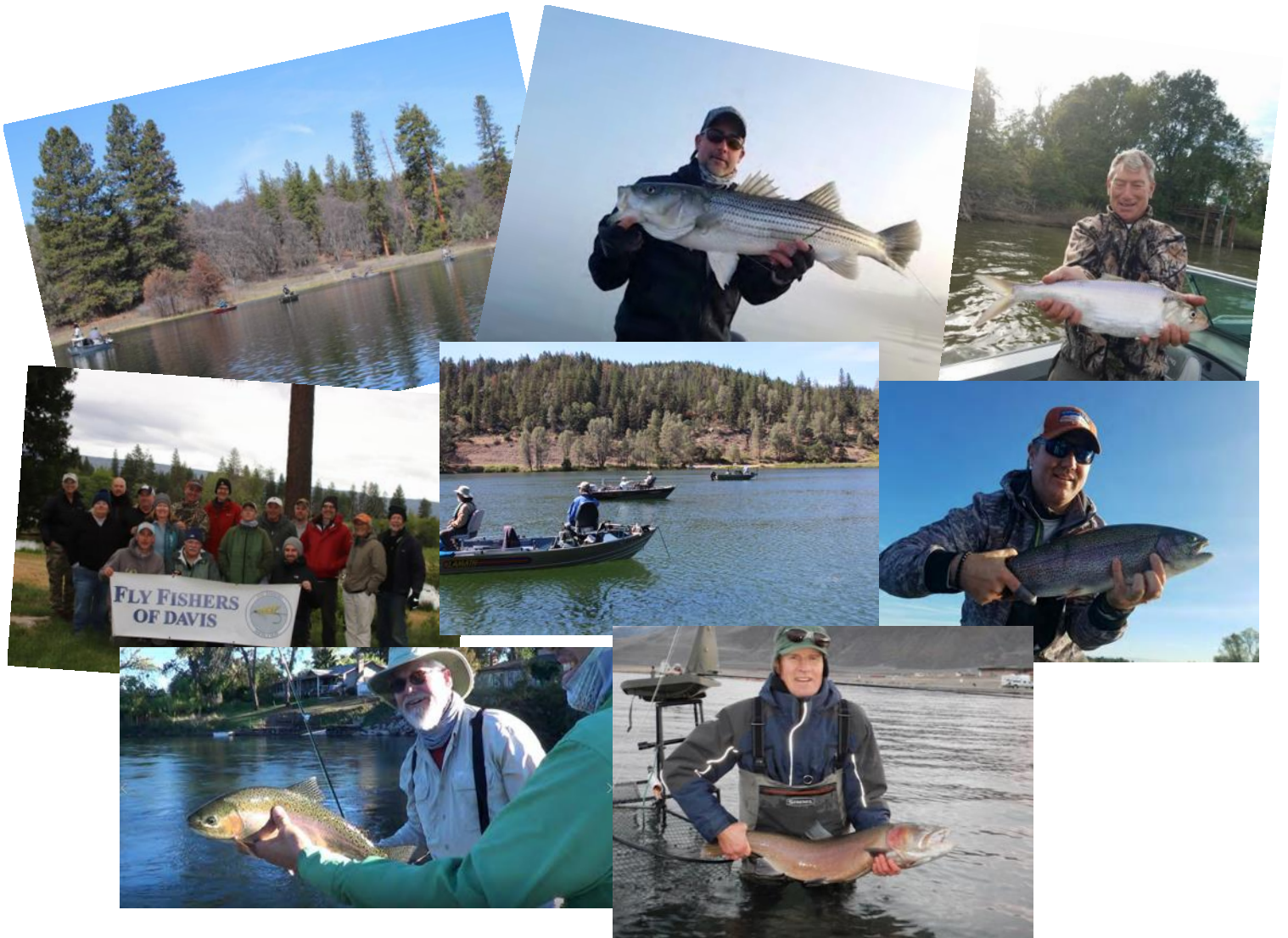

CONSERVATION REPORT

California WaterBlog published an idea from the UC Davis Center for Watershed Sciences regarding the ongoing drought. Essentially, the idea is that if water standards to protect fish are going to be loosened (as they have been in other droughts), the water users should pay for the water used and the money used to compensate the fisheries’ losses (with restoration, habitat acquisition, and other measures). As it stands now, the fisheries just lose and the water users get “free” water. Read the full story at [California WaterBlog](#). What do you think of this? Good idea or bad?

Federal and state water agencies have issued an Temporary Urgency Change Petition (TUCP) to conserve more water in Lake Oroville and Shasta Lake. The purpose of the TUCP is to help the salmon fishery later in the season by providing cold water flows during the fall, but for now it will increase salinity in the delta as the mandatory minimum flows are reduced.

Restore the Delta notes that there is no plan for flushing out the Delta if salinity control is lost, and that there was no socio-economic analysis of the effect of the impact on Delta communities or wildlife. Further, the State Water Board announced that Sacramento River Senior Contractors will receive 25% of their normal water allotment, and San Joaquin River exchange contractors will receive 75% of their allotment. Meanwhile the snow pack is nearly non-existent now and what little remains is more likely to soak into parched soils than it is to run off into rivers and reservoirs.

The bottom line is that the state is in a really bad position regarding water this year, and the fish are likely to suffer for it.

Governor Newsom announced a new voluntary agreement (VA) on water for the Bay-Delta watershed on March 29. This action was hailed as bringing peace to the water wars, but that’s probably

premature. The VA was documented in a memorandum of understanding between the state and major water contractors. Notably absent from the negotiations were the environmental advocates and fishing, tribal, and Delta stakeholders.

The Delta Reform Act encoded into state law that “[t]he longstanding constitutional principle of reasonable use and the public trust doctrine shall be the foundation of state water management policy and are particularly important and applicable to the Delta.” (Water Code section 85023). By including only the state and water contractors in the VA, public trust and reasonable use issues have been ignored.

Restore the Delta points out that the exclusionary process followed by the state fails to protect the health of the estuary, native fish and wildlife, and the jobs and communities of the delta. It’s also predicated on the Trump Administration’s biological opinions that were rewritten after the original biops did not say what the administration wanted (see the December 2019 conservation report). Doug Obegi noted that the VA process is akin to the State of California proposing to eliminate existing air quality regulations that protect public health and instead exclusively negotiating voluntary agreements with industry over how much air pollution to allow in your community.

The Turlock Irrigation District is planning a pilot project to cover irrigation canals with solar panels to protect the canals from evaporation and produce 5 megawatts of electricity. The idea was first suggested by Engineering Professor Dr. Roger Bales of UC Merced, and he’s helping to design the project. The \$20 million project will investigate how to span canals ranging from 20’ to 110’, and how much water can be saved by preventing evaporation. This is the first project of its kind, and is ideal for TID because it’s both the water provider and the electric utility.

Northern California Council, Fly Fishers International News

Well, it's that time of year when we all start thinking about spring fishing, be it trout, stripers, bass or other prey. To say the least, this has been the worst start to any year in history relative to precipitation in California. As I write this we're hearing that a good storm is coming in tomorrow, but I've heard that several times before without success. Let's hope we do get at least something to help.

Last year you may remember the summer cautions about not fishing during the mid day if the water temperatures are above 67 degrees, and to consider not fishing at all if the days are hot and the water conditions are not good for fish. All of this is likely to hold true again in 2022. I just hate to think we're going through this again, but sometimes the reality does not meet our expectations. So, let's be cautious if conditions again are bad for cold water fish like trout.

Klamath Dam Removal Moves into the Home Stretch

I spoke a lot last year about the progress on dam removal in the Klamath, with a start date of January, 2023. Well, we received the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) in late February. In comparing the impacts of dam removal to current conditions, the DEIS concludes that dam removal provides significant economic, environmental, and cultural benefit to northern California and southern Oregon. This conclusion is consistent with the findings of two other Environmental Impact Studies that evaluated dam removal over the past two decades. This was the best we could have hoped for from FERC, as it means the agency responsible for dams in America is on our side.



However, it came with 20 recommended actions by FERC that benefit us in the long run because it reduces the chance of legal action and makes conditions better for local communities. The Klamath River Renewal Corp and the signatories (NCCFFI & others) agreed to the listed actions. The problem for all of us was that it pushed the start date into 2023, and dam decommissioning to January, 2024. Here's a link: <https://klamathrenewal.org>

All of us are disappointed for this additional year, but also realize that if we have to litigate it's likely to take much more than a year, and the recommendations are important and impactful. So, Pre-construction work will begin in mid-2023 to include alterations to bridges, road work for construction, and other infrastructure changes, as well as water system improvement for Yreka. Included in this pre-construction will be the teardown of Copco II dam, as it is small and does not have silt behind it. So, Copco I will come out next year, with the other 3 out starting in January, 2024, and completion of removal by October that year.

Following the removal, restoration of the dam footprints begins in earnest. **RES - Resource Environmental Solutions** - will immediately start to bring back the river banks and surrounding watershed to its natural appearance and stability. This is a multi-year project with a 2 years implementation and 7 year monitoring and restoration plan in place. We are lucky to be working with such good contractors and partners. Our 2022 Board of Directors is hard at work developing our work plan for the next couple of years. Here's a brief summary of what is coming:

- We are developing a Communication & Marketing plan to allow us to connect with our clubs and members better. We know many clubs already teach fishing skills, but this will make what you do easier and more complete. It will be in a powerpoint format, and easy to adapt to your current classes. For clubs that want something new, this will be a "Plug & Play" type of program, with easy modules for each section. It also is tried and tested, developed by Clay Hash, past President of Gold Country Fly Fishers.
- We are also working on organizing both casting & tying events. It is fun to bring people together to learn these skills, and our goal is to bring value to what you, at the club level, are doing. We hope to make the process professional and fun.

Our goal is still focused on bringing value to our fly fishing clubs and their members. We will stay focused on this as we work to develop new and exciting programs and events for 2022 and beyond. 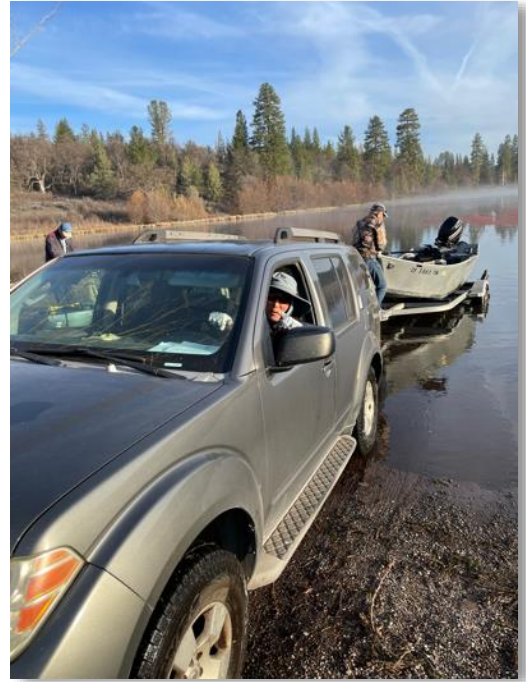

A Freebie For Club Members

A fly-tier's chart that makes getting the proportions of trout flies correct. Flies with poor proportions--wings too long or in a bad position, tails too short, etc.--don't float right, swim right, look right to convince trout, and may even fail to hook them.

Having penned quite a few books and a few hundred magazine articles on tying flies (and having researched this chart and worked it up over a period of months), I feel confident this is an aid that is accurate, very easy to understand, and extremely useful for tiers. I'm also confident that of all flies, trout flies are the ones that most need to have good proportions.










