## *Fly Casting Program*

The February 2<sup>nd</sup> Fly Casting Clinic was attended by 3 brave souls! Despite the threat of rain and wind, we were blessed with neither and the clinic was a great success. The next clinic will be on Sunday, March 16 from 9:00 AM-12:00 noon at the same location: Northstar Park (rain or shine). This clinic will focus on:

1. Presentation casts that set up the dry fly for a drag free drift. Examples are the wiggle mend, the curve cast, and the reach mend.
2. Learning the double haul or improving your double haul (hint: at the very least, clean your fly line you get a proper return after the haul).

Don't forget to take advantage of the all day, free, walk-in fly-casting lessons offered at the Fly-Fishing Show in Pleasanton, Feb. 28 - March 2. Rods are provided but you can bring your own or you may be able to demo a rod from the show. I will be there along with my fellow casting instructors on Saturday morning, March 1<sup>st</sup>. ## **CONSERVATION REPORT**

**The Delta Conveyance Project** (the Tunnel) received an Incidental Take Permit last week. This is a milestone in the Tunnel project, as it allows construction to take (kill) species listed on the California Endangered Species List during activities allowed for construction.

The Incidental Take Permit was issued to the Department of Water Resources by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. Incidental take permits are most commonly issued for construction, utility, transportation, and other infrastructure-related projects. Permittees must implement species-specific minimization and avoidance measures and fully mitigate the impacts of the project including:

- Erecting protective fencing around sensitive habitat within construction sites.
- Limited operating periods to avoid species breeding, migration, etc.
- Pre-construction surveys to identify and mark sensitive or suitable habitat features.
- Onsite construction personnel education programs covering species identification, protected status, and measures to take if one is found.

**California Trout** announced a major partnership to support Eel River dam removal and fisheries recovery. California Trout joined Round Valley Indian Tribes (RVIT), the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), Humboldt County, Mendocino County Inland Water and Power Commission (MCIWPC), Sonoma Water, and Trout Unlimited in signing a historic Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to advance a water diversion agreement associated with Pacific Gas & Electric’s (PG&E) decommissioning of the Potter Valley Project. The agreement marks a critical step in the recovery of the Eel River and its once abundant salmon fishery as it commits the parties to support the removal of the last two dams on the Eel River, which will make it the longest free flowing river in the state.

“This MOU represents years of collaboration and tough negotiations,” said Curtis Knight, CalTrout Executive Director. “Our hope is that this agreement sets the standard on how to manage aging infrastructure and modernize water management while prioritizing the health of ecosystems and the communities that rely on them.”

The announcement follows PG&E’s release of a public draft License Surrender Application on January 31, 2025, outlining the removal of both Scott and Cape Horn dams on the Eel River as part of its license surrender and decommissioning of the Potter Valley Project. PG&E is removing the dams because they lose money, no longer generate electricity, and present a seismic safety risk.

Today, CDFW committed \$18 million toward the partnership, directing \$9 million to the design and capital costs of modernizing the old diversion and building the New Eel-Russian Facility (NERF) and a parallel \$9 million as initial support for the MOU's envisioned Eel River Restoration Fund. The funding is in recognition of Californians coming together to solve a century-old conflict and to support the rural counties, Tribal government, and conservation goals outlined in the MOU.

In parallel with the MOU and dam removal efforts – and with funding support from CDFW – CalTrout published the Eel River Restoration and Conservation Plan. Developed by CalTrout, Applied River Sciences, and Stillwater Sciences, and in partnership with the RVIT and the Wiyot Tribe fisheries programs, the Plan will create a roadmap of holistic restoration and conservation actions in the Eel River watershed. The Plan will help ensure that restoration investments in the Eel River are collaborative, efficient, and effective.

[Ducks Unlimited](#) reported on the opening of 14,000 new acres of wetlands in Upper Klamath Lake north of Klamath Falls. The Barnes-Agency wetlands has been rangelands for cattle for several generations, and has now been returned to wetlands as a result of a coalition of actions taken by Ducks Unlimited, Sustainable Northwest, and others to return these lands to their natural status as wetlands. These 14,000 acres will serve as additional water storage and forage lands for ESA listed suckers, a fish that has historically served the Klamath Tribe as a main food source for thousands of years.

In addition to the benefits to the lake itself and the fisheries within it, additional water storage is now possible for use during the summer for river flows.

This project was once part of the Klamath Basin Restoration Agreement (KBRA) that Mark Rockwell signed back in 2010 on behalf of NCCFFI and the fly-fishing community. That agreement was never implemented due to lack of political support from elected leaders, and terminated in 2015 in Congress. Hence, this is a big win for the river and fisheries, even though it took an additional 10 years to get completed. The system will benefit for many years into the future as a result of this important action. The wins from the Klamath Dam Removal process keep piling up. Persistence is a requirement in Conservation advocacy.

[The Fremont Weir](#) allows water to spill into the Yolo Bypass from the Sacramento River during high flow events to prevent flooding in downtown Sacramento. The Yolo Bypass is that large area under the causeway that you drive over on the way to Sacramento. It's currently flooded, and while it's flooded it serves as a nursery for salmon, allowing them to grow much faster than they would in the river. Unfortunately, as the water recedes it can trap large fish, including salmon, steelhead, and sturgeon, when they can't make it past the weir to return to the river. For many years Department of Fish and Wildlife personnel have had to manually save as many fish as possible. But a recent upgrade to the weir now allows successful fish passage back into the river. As mentioned earlier, sometimes conservation efforts take many years of persistence.

## **CALIFORNIA BOATER CARD**

*Apply Now!*



An important reminder to all FFD boaters!

The California Boater Card shows that its holder has successfully taken and passed a NASBLA (National Association of State Boating Law Administrators) state-approved boater safety education examination. The California Boater Card program is phased-in by age for operators of motorized boats on state waterways.

As of January 1, 2024, the card is required for operators 60 years of age or younger. However, on January 1, 2025, all persons who operate on California waters will be required to have one. The lifetime card fee is \$10. The lost card replacement fee is \$5.

The card is issued by the California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW). Once DBW has received your application, proof of education and payment, and after taking an approved course and successfully passing the test, you will receive a 90-day temporary boater card by email. You should receive your official boater card by mail within 30 days from the time the application was approved.

Not only is mandatory education the law, the California Boater Card Program promotes boating safety on our waterways. U. S. Coast Guard accident data show that states with some form of boating safety education have fewer accidents and fatalities than states without any boater education requirements.



# Lookout Slough: Tidal Habitat Restoration and Flood Improvement Project






